- I. Opening of meeting, roll call, introductions, guests. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Durning at 1:40 p.m. Guests and members of the Committee were introduced as identified above. Messrs. John Vibber and John Merrill, hired on contract to expedite Governor Evans' recommendation for facilitating inspection and processing of local projects by virtue of the imposition of the project fee, were present and had been introduced to the Committee at the preceding briefing session for the members. *Mr. Briggs participated in the March deliberations but was officially excused early to catch a plane for Pittsburg prior to opening of this business session.*
- II. Minutes of February 10, 1966. It was pointed out that the amount of \$125,000 for the Scatter Creek Addition (page 12, item 1 (e), line 4 of paragraph 1) should read "\$12,500." MR. COLE MOVED AND MR. WIMMER SECONDED THAT THE MINUTES BE APPROVED AS AMENDED. MOTION CARRIED.

III. Additions to the Agenda. There were no additions to the agenda.

IV. Old Business.

- (a) Planning. A letter from Mr. Paul Benson stated that an agreement had been reached with the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation on methodology to be used in presenting statewide demand figures for recreation activities. A draft letter for Mr. Durning's signature set out the procedure for finalizing the plan. No action was taken pending the Chairman's discussion with Mr. Fred Overly, Regional Director, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, regarding an understanding about the limited "refinements" of the plan possible before the Department of Commerce and Economic Development (DCED) 701 contractual deadline of July 1, 1966.

It was requested that consideration and re-commitment in principle be given to an extension of 701 planning efforts for the next two year time period: July 1, 1966 through June 30, 1968. An application was being drafted to be sponsored by DCED about April 1 in order to be federally authorized by July; Interagency funding from the one percent project fees was proposed for this purpose. Endorsement was requested at the April meeting.

The Administrator reported that the next three months would highlight refinement of the action program and preparation of the capital improvement program as due by July 1. A progress report of accomplishments and schedule of work under BOR agreement #46-65-00001 was submitted. Mr. J. Haslett Bell would continue his work on the action phrase and on the Capital Improvement Program in order that the July 1 target dates for BOR, Central Budget Agency and the Governor's budget request could be satisfied.

- (b) Fuel Tax Transfer to Outdoor Recreation Account. Reference was made to the letter of March 11, 1966 from Douglas Toms, Director, Department of Motor Vehicles regarding the Marine Fuel Tax Refund Study and the hearings to be held March 30 in Olympia. Mr. Hendrickson indicated that

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\$430,896.79 had been transferred to the Outdoor Recreation Account from the Marine Fuel Tax Refund Account on February 21, 1966. \$29,000 has been temporarily withheld in the Marine Fuel Tax Refund Account. It was again stressed by Chairman Durning that there were disparities between the original estimates and the findings because of variance in study technique and sampling method. Instead of the 3% forecast originally estimated or the 2% used as an estimate for publicizing the Initiative, the Department of Motor Vehicles verified only .83 percent of fuel tax used in boating. The Department of Motor Vehicles scheduled a further hearing on March 30 at which the findings will be in consideration by the outdoor boating interests.

- (c) Action on local project applications. The Administrator reported that the staff was recommending 35 local projects for funding, that the projects totalled \$3,234,292 ; state share being \$753,591.; local share \$878,021.; and federal funds of \$1,602,680 . It was stated that the projects (1) were consistent with the interim statewide outdoor recreation plan accepted by the Committee in September and approved by BOR in the fall and (2) consistent with criteria set forth by the Committee. It was explained that the project rating and ranking system had proved satisfactory for identification of the most worthy and beneficial projects, in accord with the Committee policy adopted previously. All proposals required administrative refinement to qualify for release of funds and secure federal

participation in 50% financing. A summary tabulation by dividing projects into 8 regions in the State and regional maps illustrated geographic considerations used in judging projects. A fact sheet was prepared on each recommended project and files were on hand for "in depth" consideration of any application. A total of 139 local applications were evaluated to find a basis for top priority and eligibility. A total of 61 agencies applied and funds were recommended to 29 of these.

A tabulation sheet outlined how fund distribution varied within limitations for financing from Referendum 11, Initiative 215, BOR and Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds. In order to maximize the highest value combination of projects, or to get most for the money, shifts in project types and dollar value were considered within the ceiling allocations by type of fund (see columnar summary). These limitations were \$500,000 from Referendum 11, \$263,333 from Initiative 215 and \$712,000 from the Land and Water Conservation Fund. Only HUD and local dollar amounts were flexible or without a ceiling on funds. Further only \$52,666 could be allocated from Initiative 215 for development of waterfront lands. Mr. Hendrickson read the list of recommended projects and suggested funding for each project (attached).

Discussion followed regarding (1) a possible application from Seattle for Fort Lawton when it would be declared surplus property (Pending Federal legislation, if passed, would make GSA lands available for recreation purposes without cost.); (2) Highline College would be considered for funding in the next funding period since there were other projects rating better at this time based on number of the general public who would be served; (3) the possibility of further allocations to the Sammamish project out of the BOR contingency fund for excellence of the project, providing King County and other state agencies could provide additional matching money; and (4) the City of Spokane would be considered in the new funding period now that they have funds available. It was stressed that (1) projects being "staged" with partial allotment now would not obligate the Committee to further allocations to that project; (2) that there were many good projects that would be coming up for consideration after July when the new funding period would begin; (3) that the pledge of "license and other fees on domestic and foreign corporations" determined the rate of bond sales and while bond sale for this biennium was \$2 million, in the two succeeding biennia the contemplated sale might be \$4 million; and (4) that the amount listed as allocated was the upper limit of the amount for each project so that if the project cost less than that amount, the Committee would scale down its 25% commitment to the actual cost of the project.

IT WAS MOVED BY MR. CAMPBELL AND SECONDED BY MR. WIMMER THAT THE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION ADOPT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, The Committee finds each of the projects submitted by local bodies and listed on the attached document "State Allocations and Recommended Federal Fund for Local Projects, March 11, 1966" to be consistent with the Statewide Interim Outdoor Recreation Plan previously adopted by the Committee;

WHEREAS, THE Committee finds that each of the recipients has complied with the six-year capital budget requirements and has satisfied the criteria previously adopted by the I. A. C.;

WHEREAS, Funds are available for distribution by the I. A. C. in accordance with the Marine Recreation Land Act of 1964 (Initiative No. 215) Chapter 5, Laws of 1965 and the Outdoor Recreation Bond Issue (Referendum No. 11) Chapter 12, Laws of 1963, extra session, R. C. W. Chapter 43.98 subject to securing an allotment for the expenditure of funds from other authorities,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the I. A. C. hereby allocates from funds available to the Committee for each of the projects shown on the aforementioned document in amounts not to exceed those reflected therein;

The foregoing allocation is subject to the following conditions: each project must be approved by the appropriate federal authorities, and qualified for federal matching funds; each recipient shall execute and perform all required assurances and contractual arrangements; each recipient shall comply with all terms and conditions imposed by state or federal authorities including prepayment of an amount equal to 1% of the total project cost as a matching contribution to offset administrative costs relative to the project; and each recipient shall provide satisfactory evidence of fair price or costs of projects.

MOTION CARRIED. It was requested that the Administrator prepare a letter to all successful applicants outlining the next steps to be taken to process their projects. Payment would be then made upon presentation of the bills for work accomplished and proof of local expenditure of funds.

It was stressed that there were many excellent projects for which funding could not be made in this period but that they should be placed on a "shelf" so that some of the qualification work could be done to ready them for consideration in allocation during the next funding period.

IT WAS MOVED BY MR. COLE AND SECONDED BY MR. WIMMER THAT THE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION ADOPT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, The Committee finds each of the projects submitted by local public bodies listed on the attached document "Projects for Pre-Qualification, March 11, 1966" to be consistent with the Statewide Interim Outdoor Recreation plan previously adopted by the Committee;

WHEREAS, The Committee finds that each of the applicants might comply with the six-year capital budget requirements, and might satisfy the criteria previously adopted by the I. A. C.;

WHEREAS, Funds available by the I. A. C. during the current funding period have already been obligated, but that the Committee expects that additional funds will be available for allocation in the near future;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the I. A. C. hereby determines that the applicants listed have submitted projects fulfilling the basic application requirements which will be considered for future allocations and which will be forwarded to the appropriate federal authorities for project qualification and determination of eligibility for federal funding assistance. MOTION CARRIED.

- (d) State Projects. Two project applications from the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission covering (1) a four-year-stage proposal to buy 320 acres surrounding Battleground Lake in Clark County for \$550,000 or less and (2) a four-year-stage proposal to buy Anderson Lake properties of 410 acres in Jefferson County for \$470,000 were presented. The request was for first allocations in the next fiscal year beginning on July 1 for \$137,500 and \$131,600 respectively. Reference was made to Representative Robert W. Odell's correspondence about consideration for the Battleground Lake acquisition. MR. COLE MOVED AND MR. WIMMER SECONDED THAT THE IAC RECEIVE THESE APPLICATIONS FROM THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION. MOTION CARRIED.

State Department of Game. It was reported that the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation had approved Washington's request for funds to acquire lands for the Colockum Game Range in the amount of \$50,000 as the Land and Water Conservation share; the Chairman's initialing of the agreement deleting "and the acquisition of long-term options on about 20,000 acres of land" was requested by Dr. Crafts and authorized.

Mr. Crouse of the Game Department indicated that the Department of Game was prepared to submit options relative to the already approved projects but indicated they were not of an emergency nature and could be presented at the April meeting.

Federal participation. Attention of the Committee was drawn to the letter from the Regional office of the BOR dated January 27 (on file) to all federal agencies concerned with State recreational planning stating that "One of the plan requirements is that outdoor recreation plans and programs of all public agencies at all levels of government be considered in the State

plan. With few exceptions the initial state plans have been weak in recognizing the role of Federal agencies and the part that Federal programs play in satisfying state outdoor recreation needs." Since many of the states are now in the process of refining present outdoor recreation plans it was considered imperative that the State be made aware of all federal plans and programs. It was suggested that Federal agencies be invited in to the May meeting for a discussion of how Federal proposals, might relate to the State and local goals in planning for future recreational financing in the State.

Retroactive Credits. Mr. Hendrickson reported that the Technical Committee met on March 9 to initiate preparation of reimbursement applications to BOR for retroactive projects. Such priorities would be a commitment against BOR apportionment for fiscal 1967 sometime after July 1, 1966. Action would have a bearing upon funding of new proposals such as Battleground and Anderson Lakes. A representative from the Washington, D. C. BOR office indicated that the federal agency wished to terminate retroactive applications as soon as possible. A listing of retroactive credits from Departments totaled \$2,101,118.84 was provided; \$1,705,652.85 from Parks; \$364,170.99 from Department of Game and approximately \$31,295.00 from the Department of Natural Resources.

Project Appraisal Requirements. Attention of the Committee was called to the Memorandum of March 7, requesting suggestions as to how appraisal reports on projects might be handled. MR. BELL MOVED THAT THE APRIL AGENDA PRESENT ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES TO DETERMINE LAND ACQUISITION COSTS AND A RECOMMENDATION OF PROCEDURES TO PROMULGATE TRUE AND FAIR MARKET VALUE OF LAND WITH METHODS FOR REQUIRING DEVELOPMENT PLANS WHICH WOULD BE BINDING ON APPLICANTS AND IAC AS TO RESULTANT FACILITIES. MOTION CARRIED.

Sale of Land and Water Conservation Stickers. Mr. Cole urged that the Committee and participating members encourage the sale of the Land and Water Conservation Stickers, inasmuch as the state and local agencies would benefit from such sale. Letters from participating agencies regarding handling of the sale of the permits: Department of Game, February 18, 1966; Department of Natural Resources, February 25, 1966; Parks and Recreation, March 8, 1966; Department of Fisheries, February 4, 1966; and Department of Commerce and Economic Development, February 7, 1966 were summarized. Because of the state laws regarding handling of money and lack of security, most agencies felt they would be unable to participate in the actual sale of the stickers but they would display the promotional information and call the attention of the public to the stickers and where they could be obtained. The Highway Department indicated they would handle the sale of the permits at their headquarters office as they had done last year.

V. Other reports.

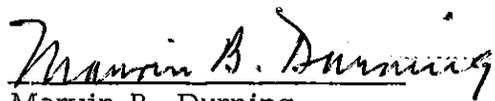
Members. The attention of the Committee was called to the March 4 letter from Warren Bishop which discussed the part that Washington State University might play in the educational aspects of outdoor recreation. It was his thought that state agencies should be involved in WSU's involvement in educational workshops and conferences. A meeting has been scheduled for May 5, 1966 to discuss such plans. It was his request that he might have the benefit of the Committee's views on the desirability of the proposed educational program.

Mr. Cole moved that the Committee thank the City of Seattle for arrangements for the meeting and express appreciation to the Technical Committee and staff for the work represented in the day's recommendation for allocations. Motion carried.

Schedule. It was the consensus of the Committee that the April meeting be held April 9 as scheduled.

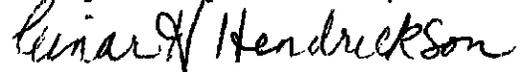
