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



To whom it may concern,

As a North Kitsap community member and as Poulsbo Rotary Club president, I am excited about the inclusive playground coming to Poulsbo! The Play for All playground project is a partnership between Poulsbo Rotary, the City of Poulsbo, and the Kitsap Community Foundation. The Poulsbo Rotary Club has been performing community service in Poulsbo, WA and surrounding North Kitsap County since 1976, often in partnership with other community organizations and the City of Poulsbo. Many of our major projects have made a significant difference to individuals and families living in North Kitsap County.

These are two of our recent major projects:

- Nelson Park House When the city converted a historic caretaker's house at Nelson Park into a transitional home for homeless women, Poulsbo Rotary led the renovation work and furnished the house, now occupied by 18- to 25-year-old women who maintain the park.
- Morrow Manor A partnership of the Poulsbo Rotary Club, the City of Poulsbo, and the YWCA
  of Kitsap County, Morrow Manor is an eight-unit housing project for survivors of domestic
  violence and their families, providing housing and supportive services for up to six years. Begun
  in 2014, the project will be complete early in 2020.

The Play for All playground will also have a major impact on local families. Of the 47,800 people in the area, 13% are living with a disability. Playgrounds are social hubs for families, and they are particularly important meeting places for families with disabilities who can struggle to find a space where they can be part of the community. A recent study on physical and developmental disabilities found that 53% of children with disabilities spend fewer than two hours a week with their peers outside of class. Inclusive playgrounds create a space where people of all ages can meet and engage with their friends—or make new ones—regardless of their abilities.

The importance of playgrounds isn't limited to children. Young people and adults with disabilities receive the same benefits of sensory input, physical play, engagement, and community and relationship building. Local organizations that serve disabled adults often take field trips to inclusive playgrounds as part of their programming. The absence of a fully inclusive playground in North Kitsap means that local programs have to travel farther to find a playground that suits their needs.

Our goal is to create the ideal playground that has something for everyone and offers ways for people of all ages to challenge themselves physically, mentally, and socially. It will become a destination location for all of the families in the community of Poulsbo and the nearby North Kitsap area.

My name is Denise Vestman and I am mom to my young adult son Benjamin, who happens to be deaf/blind and developmentally disabled. My son was born at 23 ½ weeks old, 1 lb. 6 oz. It was a miracle that he survived. Despite all his disabilities from a very early age we sought out parks often for stimulation. As Ben grew up we found it increasingly frustrating to find parks that he was able to access and for us to feel like we belonged. While most of our local parks are ADA compliant, they are not user friendly or accessible to those in wheelchairs, walkers or age appropriate to our adult children. It's not a fun feeling to feel like we should not be using the equipment or deal with stares from others because our children are now older. A fully inclusive playground would be just that, a place where all ages, all abilities can come together to play and interact with each other.

This new playground at Raab Park, of which I am on the steering committee, would not only be a wonderful place for my son to go and enjoy but also for all the children and families, young and old, typically developing or special needs in Kitsap County. It would become a destination playground for so many families near and far. Parks are such great environments for so many events: birthday parties, barbecues, play dates, family gatherings, exercise, etc. Parks are places to make new friends and connect with community. My vision for a fully inclusive playground in Poulsbo would benefit so many people. My son attends several day programs with many special needs people. These groups are always looking for outings and the closest park right now that is inclusive for young adults as well as children is well over 30 miles away. It would be wonderful to have a park close by for these groups to access without such a long commute.

I am very excited to be on this community steering committee as we work to create an amazing play space for all and look forward to having lot's of support from not only our community but from anyone who agrees that play is for all.

#### To whom it may concern,

As a North Kitsap community member and service provider for persons with special needs, I am excited about the inclusive playground coming to Poulsbo! The playground will provide a multitude of essential opportunities, including socialization, sensory stimulation, physical exercise and community-building. These are basic human needs and they will be accessible to all! As a Speech/Language Pathologist working with children, I often encourage parents to give their children experiences, give them something exciting to talk about using their hard-won communication skills. A playground is the perfect opportunity! With a variety of activities to see, hear, feel and do, there are lots of things to talk about! But with the significant amount of effort it takes them to go out anywhere, families need to go to places that are appealing to the whole family, easily accessible and experience-rich. We currently have no playground options closer than 45-60 minutes. I remember taking my two-year old daughter to our neighborhood park to play on the equipment. I had no other children and was going stir-crazy without adult stimulation. At the park I met mothers from a local playgroup, which I, luckily, then joined. As a member of this parenthood community, I reaped the benefits of wisdom and support from other mothers and my daughter gained playmates with which to practice her social, physical and independence skills (and tire her out for that blessed nap!). For people with disabilities, their physical limitations often keep them separate from everyone else and force them to be passive observers. This can be the same for their families and caregivers - the full-time demands of caring for a loved-one with disabilities can be isolating, exhausting and emotionally draining. The parents I work with struggle to connect with other parents on the same path, with the same challenges. I relish the idea of a place where these families can meet in a fun, active and inclusive location to support each other and reap the benefits of community as families of typically-developing children do.

I thank the many community members who have come together to plan, design and finance this inclusive and accessible playground. It will be a beautiful, well-used gem in North Kitsap.

I am writing on behalf of Bethel School District to express our enthusiastic support of Pierce County's proposal to the Washington Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) to improve the Sprinker Recreation Center.

Bethel School District covers 202 square miles of mostly unincorporated Pierce County and serves 120,000 residents and 21,000 students in 27 schools. The Bethel School District serves a diverse and growing population that is often underserved. We rely on centers such as the Sprinker Recreation Center to help to fill the health and recreation needs that the school district cannot provide on its own.

An aspect of the preferred plan that really appeals to us is upgrading the athletic fields and lights. Our own experience with artificially-turfed fields has been very positive – we have decreased our maintenance costs and the fields have only needed to be replaced once in 13 years of heavy use. Installing artificial turf fields and good lighting at Sprinker will save taxpayers money and give our students, families and community members a safe place to play year-round and for unlimited hours each day.

We fully support Pierce County Parks plan to improve the Sprinker Recreation Center. Throughout the planning process, we were instrumental in gathering community input.

Updating the ballfields and the parking lot, and adding amenities for families such as a spray park and picnic shelters, as well as improving access to Bresemann Forest, will give our students and families recreation opportunities beyond what the school district can provide. By providing more team and recreation options, the Sprinker Recreation Center plays a key role in the health and well-being of our community.

Should the new project be completed successfully, the West Central District would strongly consider coming back to Sprinker, as the majority of high schools in the WCD reside in Pierce County, and we would like to support the new project. We had such a positive working relationship in the past and would relish the opportunity to re-establish the same again.

The new changes, such as the trail system and other improvements, would attract the athletes and their families who participate in the tournaments back to Sprinker to take advantage of the awesome, new facility year round.

The Port of Skagit supports the City of Sedro-Woolley's application to the WA State Recreation and Conservation Office for \$500,000 in funding for the new Olmsted Park.

The Port of Skagit (Port) has been working with the City of Sedro-Woolley (City), Skagit County, Department of Enterprise Services (State), and other public entities since 2013 on adaptive reuse and transfer of ownership of the former Northern State Hospital property, now known as the Sedro-Woolley Innovation for Tomorrow Center (SWIFT Center) from the State to the Port. In 2018 the Port took title to the SWIFT Center and then transferred 14.81 acres of the property to the City of Sedro-Woolley for use as a public park.

The currently underutilized SWIFT Center property will be redeveloped into a center for technology and innovation that will spur economic development and job growth in Sedro-Woolley. Increasing public access to the SWIFT Center is a goal of the local project partners that will be realized through this project. Connectivity between the Olmsted Park and the neighboring County-owned Northern State Recreation Area will be achieved through the SWIFT Center campus. 



The 'Save Our Marsh' community group in Edmonds, WA supports the Marina Beach Park renovation grant applications (PRISM #20-1296 and #1322) from the City of Edmonds because they are a critical component of the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary Restoration Project to restore a fully functional tidal wetland along Puget Sound.

The Edmonds Marsh-Estuary has been partially disconnected from Puget Sound since the 1960's when the tidal outlet was put into a 1,600-foot pipe (with a tide gate) that discharges underwater into Puget Sound. Although the tide gate is secured open in spring and summer to allow limited tidal exchange, the fall and winter exclusion of saltwater into the marsh-estuary for many years has created a dysfunctional tidal wetland ecosystem with poor circulation. The long pipe exiting into saltwater below low tide levels has prevented adult salmon from spawning in upland streams, and has prevented juvenile Chinook salmon from rearing and feeding in an estuary.

There is substantial community support for this restoration project. Many residents and visitors to Edmonds go to the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary and Marina Beach Park to enjoy the natural setting and the recreational and wildlife viewing opportunities. The north edge of the Marsh has observation platforms and a boardwalk that provide excellent viewing opportunities. Over 190 different bird species have been documented at the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary and the restoration project will enhance the estuarine habitat for shorebirds as well as aquatic species. Both coho and chum salmon were observed in the past in the streams draining into the marsh and the Edmonds community is united in its desire to bring salmon back for future generations to enjoy.

The renovation design proposed for Marina Beach Park will allow the public to view adult salmon migrating up the tidal channel. There is a very limited number of publicly accessible locations for people to see wild salmon in their natural setting, and this project will greatly add to the public's wildlife viewing and educational opportunities.

We urge the RCO to approve the grant funding requested that will benefit salmon, wildlife, and people throughout the State that appreciate access to our natural resources.

This project will reconnect Puget Sound to the estuary marsh by restoring Willow Creek. Willow Creek is an historically salmon-bearing stream currently being piped underground through the park. Just north of the park, the creek will connect with the Edmonds Marsh to return tidal flows, saltwater exchange, and salmon to the marsh.

Being directly upstream from the City's proposed project we are excited that we will be able to make an impactful ecological and educational connection between WCSWEC and the Sound once this project is complete. Once Willow Creek is connected to the sound that allows for fish passage, we will seek permits from WDFW to begin releases of coho juveniles into Willow Creek in hopes of having returns to spawn. We currently have permits to release into other local Edmonds watersheds, mainly Shell Creek.

We also welcome the physical connection between the nearshore habitat and riparian habitat at Willow Creek that passes through the Edmonds Marsh that will provide the community an intimate experience of the key habitats crucial to salmon including stunning views of salmon runs from multiple angles within the park as they head up stream toward WCSWEC to spawn. The community's overall sense of place will be enhanced with new and improved amenities including an all-abilities playground, nature play area, accessible scenic overlooks, dog park, a hand boat launch access point, and restrooms at two new entry plazas. As well, safety and flood prevention will be improved through consolidated parking lots and pedestrian pathways.

#### To Whom It May Concern:

Students Saving Salmon club from Edmonds-Woodway High School and Meadowdale High School support the Marina Beach Park renovation grant applications (PRISM #20-1296 and #1322) because it will reopen a tidal channel between the beach and the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary that will allow salmon to once again return to Edmonds streams.

Students Saving Salmon was formed in 2014 by students concerned about the environment, especially salmon and their habitat, and our goal is to return salmon to all of the streams in Edmonds. Students participate in field studies to collect and disseminate scientific information; conduct community outreach, and assist community salmon enhancement and habitat restoration efforts.

We have collected data on water quality, pollutants and habitat conditions in the Edmonds Marsh and its' tributary streams since 2015 that confirm that restoring open tidal exchange is critical for the health of the Marsh-Estuary and return of salmon. Conditions in the Marsh-Estuary have deteriorated since the 1960's when the estuary outlet was put into a 1,600-foot underground pipe with a tide gate that has prevented tidal exchange causing sedimentation backup, proliferation of invasive species, restricted water circulation, overheating, and total blockage of salmon migration.

This project will contribute to Washington State goals to restore the nearshore environment in Puget Sound for salmon and other aquatic and wildlife species, and we urge the RCO to approve the applications.

This 300-foot stretch of shoreline needs critical repair to protect Blaine's investment in the new play structures and picnic areas which has become the most popular park within the City. This project will also protect the adjacent Wastewater Treatment Facility.

Equally important, this grant will at the same time, besides protecting critical infrastructure from wave action erosion, will allow safe public access to the shore for the first time.



The Friends of LBA Woods is a volunteer stewardship group under the aegis of the City of Olympia's Parks Stewardship Program. The Friends of LBA Woods represents the many members of the Olympia-area community who successfully campaigned in 2012-2017 to save the LBA Woods as public parkland, to support ongoing stewardship of this parkland, and to pass the 2015 Metropolitan Parks District measure. Between 2017 and 2020, we hosted or cohosted 27 work parties and offered more than a dozen guided nature walks in the LBA Woods.

We are committed to supporting our parks for the physical and mental well-being of our community, especially now as public outdoor spaces—even without full access to amenities—are playing an increasingly critical role in maintaining the health of communities during difficult times.

With this letter, the Friends of LBA Woods fully supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications for projects (described below), all of which align with the goals of the City's 2016 Parks Plan but also comport with the overarching goal of *Sustainable Thurston* (Thurston County Regional Planning Council, 2013), which states that "A sustainable community will enhance quality of life, foster economic vitality, and protect the environment while balancing our needs today with those of future residents."

#### **Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition**

Funding assistance is essential for the acquisition of the multi-use park Olympia that will satisfy Olympia's long-standing, oft-stated, and well-supported need for dedicated standard-size soccer fields. Careful, thoughtful design and construction of this park promises to be rightfully costly as the current master plan concept plans aim to aesthetically integrate soccer fields, parking areas, areas of protected natural wetlands and forested groves, play areas, and potentially community gardens, bike skills area, nature trails, sports loops, and open fields. Given that this long-awaited park will serve the larger Thurston County community (and likely beyond), the recreation value is especially great and should be supported through larger-than-Olympia funding resources.

#### **Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development**

The acquisition of this 67-acre parcel helps balance the type of park available on Olympia's west side. Like LBA Woods, the Kaiser Woods parcel offers trails through mature upland forest and

varied terrain valued by both hikers, walkers, and mountain bikers. The development plans for this park have garnered heavy and lively interest from the public. The Olympia Parks Department is taking great care to develop this park with sensitivity to the natural environment, the various needs of the potential park users, and the neighboring land owners. This exemplary level of kind of care should be supported through grant funding.

#### **LBA Park Field #2 Renovations**

Though only 40 years old, the decrepitude of the LBA Park ballfield #2 cannot be overstated. It is unsafe for use and needs a total renovation and improved features to meet ADA standards to be useful for play and inclusive for all.

#### **Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition**

Neighborhood parks make a significant contribution to the quality of life in Olympia. This corner of the north-east quadrant of Olympia is currently underserved by parks. The need for a park in the Lilly Road area was identified as a community need in the 2004 Parks Plan. With the projected increased population growth of Olympia and its Urban Growth Area, this is a timely and important acquisition and one that would help meet the 2016 Parks Plan goal of having a park within one-half mile of every residence.

We see the Olympia waterfront area, including waterfront parks and trails, as a treasure for the greater Olympia area. We advocate that the shoreline area be managed for the greatest long term net benefit to the entire community.

We write as a member of the YES Olympia Parks that successfully advocated for the establishment of the Olympia Municipal Parks District and advocates for parks, trails, and recreation projects generally.

To this end, Friends of the Waterfront supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications as follows.

## **Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition**

- Olympia currently has no standard soccer fields. Passage of our second voted parks funding measure has provided the wherewithal to tackle this serious deficiency. The soccer fields in this project will serve not just soccer games but also other sports that need rectangular fields such as youth football, ultimate frisbee, and lacrosse. It will also serve participants from all of Thurston County, not just Olympia.
- This project is now in the master planning stage, including a great deal of community involvement. It will be very expensive and will be constructed in stages over a number of years. Funding assistance from the state will be vital.

## **Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development**

• This project, now in the master planning stage, will provide for both mountain bike trails and hiking trails in Kaiser Woods. There has

been very heavy interest in this project from local mountain biking enthusiasts who have participated in large numbers in the planning process.

 Care is being taken to preserve the natural character of this wooded property.

#### LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

- The LBA Park ballfields were developed over 40 years ago. All aspects of Field #2 are in such poor condition that this field cannot be used due to safety concerns. This puts a strain on the city's other fields.
- Field #2 will be completely renovated, including new ADA features. It will serve the needs of youth teams.

## **Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition**

- Olympia's Parks Plan calls for neighborhood parks within one-half mile of every residence, which is considered a comfortable walking distance and is intended to both increase walking and decrease vehicle use. This standard has become ever more important as residential zoning becomes denser to accommodate increased population within the current Urban growth Area in compliance with the state Growth Management Act.
- The Lilly Road area does not presently have a neighborhood park.

To whom it may concern,

My name is Arlo Evasick, owner and operator of GSL Tournaments based out of Pierce County. As a local tournament provider for youth athletes I can attest the many benefits provided by having access to turfed facilities. We run 27 events per year between March and August, primarily in Puyallup, Tacoma, Lakewood, and Fife. On average we host 75 teams per weekend, some weekends are well over 100. This is just for youth baseball 9-14U, this does not include high school aged games, fastpitch, slowpitch, and other recreational activities every weekend. While there are many complexes and fields, on a weekly basis, there are not enough and we are always looking for more access.

The opportunity to play on fields is one thing, the opportunity to play on quality, updated and safe facilities in the Pierce County area is another. When facilities make the decision to turf the infields it eliminates almost every concern from the teams about the quality of play. It also allows for tournament providers, local teams, and travel teams to have a resource available when the weather is or has been rainy – which seems to be the case frequently in the Northwest. There are limited amounts of turf fields in our county and the ones that are get filled as quickly as they become available. The turf guarantees kids are able to play regardless of weather and the demand for having four additional turf infields wouldn't even come class to meeting the needs of the youth athletes in Pierce County.

While it may cost more now to get this project down, there is no question the value that adding four turf infields to Pierce County would bring to our communities both for our youth and financially. Adding turf takes a well maintained, slightly above average complex and instantly puts it at the top of the list for Pierce County. We rent these parks every available weekend between March and August. Last year we hosted part of our events at Fort Steilacoom Park 15 weekends during that period of time. If the infields were to be turfed, we would expand our rentals through all of August, September, and October. We would also extend our weekend only rentals 2-3 additional days so we would be able to use the complex for high school aged games Wednesday – Sunday.

In addition to our needs, there are high schools and local leagues that also need access to better facilities. We are just a small piece of the puzzle, however, with our demand for fields and the lack of supply, I know we would be able to more than double our rental capacity with the city of Lakewood if this were to happen. Thank you for taking the time to consider this project and we a proud to be a strong member of youth sports in Pierce County.

We live in the Evergreen State, which immediately brings to mind our many green belts, forests, and parks. Of course, this is all due to the amount of rainfall that keeps us green.

Unfortunately, that very rainfall is often the enemy of the Baseball Player. Probably no other sport is as mindful to the weather and how it affects game play than baseball. Or, at least until the development of all-weather turf.

The Lakewood Baseball Club has been actively using the fields in Lakewood since 1991. The fields at Ft. Steilacoom are some of the very few all level baseball fields (fields that can handle the needs of the various age levels). This makes them very desirable.

The fields have been the home of Lakewood Baseball Club's annual Opening Day tournament. A day where all of our teams play in one place after a fun opening ceremony. Unfortunately, roughly 1/3 of the ceremonies have been cancelled or modified due to weather conditions.

Youth Baseball has also seen a significant surge in the Pacific Northwest, especially among elite level teams (travel tournament teams). Tournament organizations are continually searching for facilities that can host multiple games and age levels and are located in desirable locations. Ft. Steilacoom is highly sought as it has many park amenities available (restrooms, playgrounds, good parking).

However, being a traditional dirt infield has the tournament groups often relying on Ft. Steilacoom as a backup location or for only a few months each year. Baseball has become an 8-month long endeavor.

The addition of artificial turf at Ft. Steilacoom would increase the desirability of additional use and a longer Baseball season for both elite level teams as well as local recreational leagues (such as Lakewood Baseball Club). LBC has long desired to have a Fall Season, but the lack of local turf fields has kept that dream well rested.

Additional use not only increases the financial stability of the Park programs and fields, but directly impact the local community. Baseball is a family-oriented sport. Users visit restaurants, buy groceries, supplies, and buy gas.

My name is Jill Kintner, I am a professional mountain biker, and also a BMX Olympic Bronze medalist from the 2008 Beijing Games, and would like to write a letter in support of the Pump track project in Port Angeles.

Over the years, I have attended dozens of Pro Downhill events at Dry Hill as part of the NW Cup, and have seen Port Angeles thrive as one of the best venues in the US, drawing both local and International talent alike. Port Angeles is a "Bike Town" with amazing trails, good restaurants, beautiful landscape, and now it needs a well thought out skills park for future generations to prosper on 2 wheels.

In my hometown of Bellingham, WA, I was involved with the local Mtb trail advocacy group – Whatcom County Mountain Bike Coalition (W.M.B.C.), to help build a local public pump track. I raised a little bit of money myself to get the project going, and worked with the city council and parks department to ultimately create the first pump track in Bellingham at Whatcom falls park.

The Whatcom Falls Pump track project has been wildly successful, getting more kids and adults outside and off computer screens, which was the purpose of the grant we won (No kid left indoors). It brought our community together through various build days, and also as place to catch up with people and ride. This track offers a safe location to build skills together, learn, and progress as a group. I honestly am amazed at the progress from the kids in my neighborhood in such a short time. Some kids would even get up at 6am before school to ride, showing great passion, and you can outwardly see their confidence grow as humans, which is nice to see.

The trail counter we installed was averaging something like 30,000 visits per month in summer (trips through the gate), in a space that was previously unused flat lumpy grass. Since the grand opening of WF pump track in spring 2018, two more pump tracks have been built in different areas of town, and the demand continues. Another big project is approved that will consider bikers alongside different user groups such as dog owners, parents with small kids, spectators, walkers, etc.

In conclusion, pump tracks are a great boost to any community. You don't need a membership to ride, any bike will work, new people show interest in a healthy activity, and it brings a positive interest close to where people live. People will come from all over to ride a new track, and probably stay to see what else Port Angeles has to offer. It will be amazing!!

My name is Scott Tucker and I am the co-director of the NW Cup Downhill Mountain Bike Series. The NW Cup is based out of Port Angeles, but we have races in Oregon, Idaho, Montana, and other parts of Washington. I have been directing mountain bike events for about 15 years now, as well as other cycling and multisport events.

Port Angeles is known throughout the mountain biking world as a "world-class" destination. The trail systems, the natural beauty, the events, and access all add up to the Olympic Peninsula being on most riders' target to visit at some point. Hosting races has given me the opportunity to travel to other bicycling destinations up and down the West Coast and while they all have their own strengths, none quite add up to what we enjoy here. With one exception, a pump track.

Wherever we go, you can usually find a pump track crawling with kids of all ages riding next to expert level adults enjoying the same track in their own ways. You can spend half a day working on your skills and getting a proper workout, or add it to either end of day of riding the trails in the area. It is a safe, controlled environment to hone the skills needed to excel on trails and our local BMX track, which can be fairly intimidating to the new rider.

Our NW Cup Downhill events attract 400-500 participants as well as family and support, at least two weekends a year, 3 days at a time. Our trail system also brings people to self-recreate every day of the year. Having a pump track for them to use would show the commitment Port Angeles has to cycling and recreation as a whole.

For the last 10 years, NW Cup has focused our growth on the youth, providing beginner focused tracks suited to younger age groups. This has caused an explosion in attendance that is still resonating as starting kids early is the way to create life-long cyclists. Bicycles have always been, and still are such a huge part of my life, I find myself obsessed with providing that opportunity any way I can. Supporting a pump-track in our town is another piece to that puzzle of helping kids, and all people for that matter in our community make healthy choices.

To sum it up, I am in full support of Port Angeles investing in a pump track. I look forward to seeing people of all backgrounds recreating together in a healthy, safe environment.

The swimming pool has been a sparkling gem in our city since 1934 and with your aid we can continue to keep our pool the glowing heart of our community.

Not only has this gem supplied our community with a place for our families to 'hang out' in the summer, it has taught thousands of children how to swim. With all of the outdoor recreation, such boating, jet skiing, tubing, wind surfing, fishing and other activities, on our local lakes and rivers, I am sure we have saved lives through the skills that have been taught at this facility. It is the highest priority for our community to ensure that no lives are lost due to a lack of swimming skills.

There are multiple positive community benefits that an outdoor swimming pool designed for both recreation and competition can provide for White Salmon. Youth and adults can learn to swim, practice and compete in the local sports of competitive swimming and water polo, enjoy synchronized swimming, become certified in Scuba Diving, become a certified Water Swimming Instructor or Lifeguard, take water aerobics, lap swim for fitness, or just enjoy open play for children and families in a safe environment.

As Head Coach since 2000 for the Hood River Valley Swim Team and Columbia Gorge Masters, I have coached hundreds of children and adults from the entire Columbia River Gorge. There are many swimmers from White Salmon who have to travel across the river in order to participate in competitive swimming. These swimmers have high expectations, and have had much success in the sport. In 2012 Scott Bergstrom, White Salmon native, attended the Swimming Olympic Team Trials in Omaha, Nebraska, competing in the 200m Butterfly (the same event as the well known Michael Phelps). He also received a swimming scholarship to attend the University of Denver. Other White Salmon swimmers have gone on to compete in college, including Justine Rawding at Niagara University and Mariah Rawding Bowdoin College. Brett Rawding used the swimming skills he learned to excel in the underwater egress training course in the Army. Naomi Elyard is pursuing kayaking - she took a semester to tackle high level kayaking challenges while attending classes through the World Class Academy Kayak School. I believe you can see how a local pool supports our local youth in achieving their dreams. Having a pool that supports competition and water sports locally will enable athletes to continue their love of swimming no matter where they go and what they pursue in life.

Competition brings more than just opportunities to the athletes. Swim meets and water polo tournaments bring in much needed dollars to the local economy. These are day &/or weekend long

events with one to two hundred people in attendance. The families stay in local hotels, spend money at the local restaurants and grocery stores, and the support they give goes well beyond the weekend. They go wine tasting and become wine club members to support the wineries through the winter; they love art and return for our Fall Art Walk and our Summer Art and Wine Fusion, they are white water aficionados and come back to raft and kayak on the White Salmon River in the summer. The Columbia River Gorge is a tourist destination, and once people come to White Salmon and enjoy the town, many times they look for opportunities to return. These events are much more than the sum of their parts. They really benefit the entire community.

Youth are not the only ones who would benefit from a competitive aquatic venue. The Columbia Gorge Masters swim team provides swim training for many adults from White Salmon as well. We have trained Ironman Triathletes, as well as competitive masters swimmers and adults who just want to stay in good physical shape. We are writing to express our support for the City of Mountlake Terrace's grant application for improvements to the Evergreen Playfield complex. The Evergreen Playfield complex was constructed in 1976 on 16 acres and is the largest sport complex in south Snohomish County. It consists of 5 baseball and softball fields, 2 grass soccer and football fields, an all-weather soccer field, a quarter mile track, and four lighted tennis courts. The Evergreen Playfield complex is also used by both locals and visitors for citywide special events and festivals.

The city is applying for Youth Athletic Facilities grant funding to repair and resurface the four tennis courts, install new fencing and tennis posts, install LED lighting to be more energy efficient than existing lighting, and improve ADA access to the parking area and trails. I grew up in Grays Harbor County and can remember attending professional, minor league baseball games at Olympic Stadium. I also remember being able to play there for the first time, in my teens. The unique way the stadium makes the game sound cannot be matched by any other facility in Washington State. It has an old time baseball mystic and provides for a player and spectator experience that will be remembered for a lifetime.

As an adult, I have coached youth and High School Baseball. It has always been a highlight of our seasons to be able to play games at Olympic Stadium and something that is very much looked forward to by players, parents and coaches. The repairs and improvements that are included in this project proposal, will allow the stadium to host a wider spectrum of events and larger events, to help draw visitors from outside the community. I am a coach for Ilwaco High School's varsity baseball team. I am also very involved in the youth baseball program in our area. I have coached and have had my own children involved with youth baseball in this area for the last ten years.

This is an exciting time for baseball in our community. We have involvement like I have never seen. In addition, we are having success on the field that is also unprecedented. We are building a program that is something that this community is very proud of.

Our facilities are very dilapidated at nearly every baseball field that we have. There has not been any significant investment on the fields that serve the youth players after about age 10.

Compounding this problem is the fact that our weather is very extreme. We average nearly eight *feet* of rain per year. Playing baseball in this area requires a field with excellent drainage characteristics.

The field at Ilwaco Community Park has the unique ability to drain water. It is playable at times when other fields will still have standing water on them. As a result, our teams get to play games and practice when other teams are sitting at home. Teams of all ages utilize this field to practice on when the weather has made their home field unplayable. This is a huge asset to our baseball program.

The dugouts at the field are in serious need of attention. They are rotten and failing. There is also very limited storage for the equipment used to maintain the fields. The coaches, players and families of the teams help with the maintenance the field, and they need access to the equipment to do this. The current storage area is very small and the roof leaks badly, causing damage to the items inside.

Also, with increased demand from school based athletic teams, certain school athletic teams are using the SHP turf as well, pushing community programs to 5 pm start times.

The turf at Sehmel Park is a vital facility for independant programs in Gig Harbor, and the ability for PenMet to meet the demands presented is a critical piece toward maintaining a successful youth recreational program here.

PenMet Parks has partnered with Narrows F.C., as well as countless other programs, sharing facilities, helping in scheduling (and often rescheduling)

functions. At Narrows F.C., we look forward with support for this new field resurfacing project.

We encourage and welcome the support that RCFB can lend to this project.

Please consider supporting the funding request for Rainier View Park's covered playshed. Near my house in Sumner is an older park in our system, Loyalty Park. With giant trees shading its court, it gets a lot of use from a variety of people for different reasons. You walk by in the evening and see two or three boys shooting hoops while their grandmother sits on a nearby bench and watches, taking a couple shots herself. One night each week, a large group of Pacific Islander families set up volleyball nets and start playing with a wide range of ages. With basketball shut down for coronavirus, the court has been repurposed for pickleball most nights.

Across town, Rainier View Park opened over 10 years ago, but it's still a "young" park and the contrast is stark. Its current open basketball court remains nearly unused because there's no sense of place yet as there is in Loyalty. We don't have time to wait 50 years for the trees to grow: this project builds the kind of place that encourages similar gathering throughout the year, providing shelter and lights for our dark rainy winter days and shade in our sunny summer days. I can't think of a better project to bring the same or higher level of activity to a different area of Sumner, an area poised to see the addition of Sumner's multi-family housing, an area that needs more gathering and activity options, especially for youth.

As with every community, we've been discussing equity and social justice a lot. We are committed to bring a higher level of service to our neighborhoods that are typically lower income with more youth in multi-family living situations needing good, open, free options that not only allow but encourage activity and gathering throughout the year. This project invites and encourages a wider range of sports; offers safe protection from the elements; and builds in the multi-generational gathering with adjacent seating that makes our parks not just places to recreate but also places to build family memories together.

The building is outdated, run down, and lacking ADA standards that are essential for park users. On multiple occasions the requests have been made by parents and fans in attendance to use our internal restroom at the concession stands, due to the fact that the parks bathroom is unusable to these people. This is a security and health risk, which is hard for Aberdeen Little League to handle. The city has provided an outside ADA sani-can to help with these requests, but this response to the situation is weak and should not be a permanent fix. The current facility is limited to one toilet for men and two for the women.

This is a priority project for our current Little League Board. With an estimated usage of 15,000 people using this facility during our sports season, in addition to daily uses including students from surrounding schools. The everyday usage from parks visitors and dog walkers, has pushed this facility beyond a routine life expectancy. Our Parks Dept has done an exceptional job keeping this old building in functioning order, but it is a challenge. The Parks Dept has shown the ability to complete other bathroom projects recently in their other parks.

As president of Aberdeen Little League, a new bathroom facility would be a great addition to an already beautiful baseball facility. Our fields are kept to the highest standards, as it's not uncommon to be told in district meetings by other presidents how lucky we are (Aberdeen) to have such a high quality athletic complex. Aberdeen Little League is one of very few Little League programs that do not maintain our own fields. I have personally worked hand in hand with all parties involved with the Parks Dept., to make sure projects and maintence issues have been taken care of. With the latest project completion of getting the entire field painted along with conjoining fields, it would be amazing to have a new bathroom facility to match our amazing fields and stands. 





Whatcom County 2020 PDR Program Property - Proposed Protection Area







I'm writing in support of BMLT's proposals for four conservation easements. All four would provide protection to salmonid bearing streams, and would prevent water quality degradation associated with future development. Two of the projects would add benefit to previously completed fish passage projects.

The Allen Family Ranch (#20-1436) and the Peyton Ranch (#20-1435) projects would protect water quality in the tributary headwaters of Patit Creek, which is used by summer steelhead for spawning and rearing.

The Blue Mountain Ranch project (#20-1816) would protect part of Dry Pataha Creek, where summer steelhead were historically present, part of Pataha Creek, where summer steelhead are presumed present. Steelhead rearing is documented in Pataha Creek below the confluence of these two creeks. In 2008, we completed an RCO-funded fish passage project in Pataha Creek (RCO #06-2084), downstream of this property.

The Wolf Fork Ranch project (#20-1669) protects part of the Wolf Fork and its major tributaries Whitney Creek and Coates Creek. Wolf Fork provides spawning for summer steelhead and bull trout. Whitney and Coates Creeks provide rearing for summer steelhead, and bull trout are presumed present. In 2010, we completed an RCO-funded fish passage project (RCO #09-1554) on this property, in Whitney Creek.

Our organization's mission is to restore sustainable populations of native salmonids by enhancing habitat, providing public education, and promoting recreational angling. The habitat and water quality benefits provided by these projects support our mission.

The Washington Department of Natural Resources is strongly supportive of the work described in the Oak Creek Wildlife Area Forest Restoration grant project proposal. The project area is located within the 20-Year Forest Health Strategic Plan for eastern Washington's Tieton priority planning area, which was identified as a high priority planning area due to values at risk and forest health issues.

The forest restoration thinning and prescribed fire activities planned and proposed for funding in this area will not only alter future fire behavior, but will also increase the growth and vigor of the remaining trees, providing resistance to tree mortality causing insects, diseases and drought. The forest restoration work will also create wildlife habitat and diversify the native plant communities, both of which are important for sustaining overall biodiversity and ecological connectivity on public lands in our state.

Funding this proposal would enable the implementation of forest health treatments in a fire-prone landscape in eastern Washington. This work, in addition to work already completed by the WDFW and USDA Forest Service in the Tieton landscape, will contribute to restoring the forest to a more resilient landscape in the face of a changing climate. Restoring forests to more resilient landscapes requires the participation of all landowners, across all land ownership boundaries, because fires, insects, diseases and droughts do not stop at jurisdictional boundaries. The WDFW is already working with the Tapash Sustainable Forest Collaborative (a planning and implementation group comprised of members from WA DNR, WDFW, The Nature Conservancy, USDA Forest Service and the Yakama Nation) during the planning and implementing this work, which shows a forest health and restoration commitment not only to WDFW lands, but the Tieton landscape as a whole.

In summary, DNR strongly recommends funding this grant proposal as it will contribute to improving forest health and wildfire resilience in the Tieton watershed. The Tieton watershed is a priority planning area for the 20-year Forest Health Strategic Plan for eastern Washington and this proposal will further our shared goals of increasing the pace and scale of forest health treatments in this important watershed. This proposal is a great example of land managers working to address key forest health issues in a key part of the state in alignment with statewide forest health priorities.

To Whom It May Concern,

I am writing on behalf of the East Cascades Oak Partnership (ECOP) for which Columbia Land Trust is the fiscal sponsor. During the last two years, 20 regional partners and more than 200 stakeholders invested over 3,000 hours in the creation of a strategic plan that will improve the pace, scale, and effectiveness of Oregon white oak conservation in the East Cascades ecoregion. ECOP's plan identifies the primary ways people interact with oak systems, the ecological stress that results from those interactions, and the strategies we can employ to improve outcomes for oak systems by modifying human behavior.

Oak systems exist at lower elevations in the foothills of the Cascade and Simcoe Mountains where human activity is concentrated. The oak systems of the East Cascades have undergone substantial ecological change since European settlement resulting from fire suppression, grazing, logging and conversion. Cultural traditions practiced by the tribes and bands of the Yakama Nation were imperiled and access to traditional food sources dramatically curtailed. The ecological and social impacts of these events are exacerbated by climate change. Fire suppression has led to substantial shifts in oak system stand structure and species composition, resulting in urgent threats of conifer encroachment, higher intensity fire, and habitat oversimplification, including loss of pollinator habitat.

Oak systems are characterized by steep moisture, temperature, and elevational gradients, attributes expected to facilitate species adaptation to climate change. These systems host many endemic, rare, threatened, and endangered species, but their single most important virtue may be the magnitude and diversity of species they support – oak systems are truly one of the most biodiverse systems in the Pacific Northwest. Addressing the threats they face is critical to long term system resilience and the survival of hundreds of associated species. Additionally, lowering the risk of catastrophic fire has the potential to moderate smoke impacts on human health and local economies, and improve safety for first responders.

WDFW's Oak Creek proposal represents the kind of proactive, thoughtful management the East Cascades Oak Partnership is empowering through its strategic plan. We encourage WWRP's investment in this incredibly unique landscape.

I am writing to express The Nature Conservancy's support for the Oak Creek Forest Restoration proposal under the State Lands Restoration and Enhancement Category.

Since 2005, the Conservancy has been committed, working with a variety of partners, to secure highly valued habitat threatened by development in the central Cascades. The Tieton Oak Creek checkerboard development threat was abated in 2007. At the same time, the Conservancy invested heavily in promoting science based dry forest restoration in form of original science, policy, diversifying funding and on the ground implementation. The genesis of dry forest restoration program for Washington Chapter of the Conservancy was initiated in Oak Creek with the purchase of Plum Creek Timber lands and subsequent sale to Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. The Conservancy maintained ownership of one section of land and worked with WDFW and the University of Washington to develop the Tieton/Oak Creek Landscape Assessment and Treatment Prioritization plan. We then hired a restoration forester that worked in the Tieton Oak Creek landscape to further forest and aquatic restoration outcomes across WDFW, TNC, Forest Service, Wa. Dept. of Natural Resources checkerboard ownership for a period of three years.

With continued investment by WDFW, and many partners, most of the original prioritized forest restoration and aquatic goals in the Oak Creek watershed have been met. This proposal invests in an important, and often last step in dry forest restoration, implementing prescribed fire. Important for a variety of plant and animal species, as well as setting this watershed up for better fire effects in the face of inevitable future unplanned fire ignitions. Furthermore, is exciting to see this proposal expand proposed mechanical restoration treatments outside of the oak creek watershed as part of the larger Tieton watershed that is a priority watershed of Tapash Sustainable Forest Collaborative and the EWA Forest Health 20 Year Forest Health Strategy. Coordinated restoration investments are moving toward more tangible results, resilient forest and watershed conditions in a changing climate. Ducks Unlimited (DU) submits this letter to express our endorsement of Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's (WDFW) enhancement actions at the Elk River Unit. Upon acquisition of the Elk River Unit (formerly known as the Grayland Property), WDFW has initiated various activities to reduce noxious vegetation and increase ecologic functions. WDFW's objectives with the actions proposed to the State Lands Restoration Program are to improve habitat conditions for two species with sensitive Federal and State population listings: Marbled Murrelet (Federal -Threatened, State - Endangered) and Dusky Canada Goose (Federal - Species of Concern / State - Species of Greatest Conservation Need).

With this project, WDFW will augment weed control efforts at newly acquired lands in Grays Harbor County to facilitate development of habitats that benefit Marbled Murrelet and wintering waterfowl on more than 65 acres of forest and wetlands. A narrow string of mature Sitka Spruce (estimated older than 100 years) have unrealized potential as Marbled Murrelet habitat due to surroundings of insufficient canopy height. Murrelets require forest structure of sufficient height and depth to provide vertical and horizontal cover. Marbled Murrelet in adjacent forests with adequate height and depth have been documented within this Wildlife Area. Forest growth adjacent to this string of older trees is impaired by dense growth of scotch broom. Removing the scotch broom to release existing trees and/or replant additional trees will accelerate the conversion to suitable nesting habitat for Marbled Murrelet. Additional weed-control efforts will be directed to controlling invasive reed-canary grass and managing other wetland species to provide foraging and open water habitats for Dusky Canada Goose and other waterfowl.

#### To Whom It May Concern:

The Okanogan Conservation District has long supported the conservation of shrub-steppe ecosystems in Okanogan County. We support the Okanogan County Shrub-Steppe Restoration RCO grant project proposed by WDFW's Sinlahekin and Methow Wildlife Areas. Their grant proposal is centered upon the restoration of approximately 212 acres of weed-infested, abandoned dryland agricultural fields back to their native shrub-steppe habitat.

In their current state, the proposed restoration fields currently act as seed beds for invasive species and provide little to no wildlife benefit. In recognizing that over half of Washington's native shrub-steppe has been lost, we see tremendous value in both preserving current habitats and restoring areas that may otherwise cause adverse effects on surrounding native ecosystems. The Sinlahekin and Methow Wildlife Areas both have nearly 80 years each of sustainable land management and wildland restoration experience and are therefore fully dedicated and capable of restoring native habitats in Okanogan County. Highlighting the commitment and collaboration behind this type of grant proposal is the partnership of the Bonneville Power Administration, Bureau of Land Management, BFI Native Seeds Inc., and Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's publication: Shrub-Steppe and Grassland Restoration Manual for the Columbia River Basin. The Methow Conservancy, the Methow Valley's local land trust organization, is writing this letter to support the Okanogan County Shrub-Steppe Restoration RCO grant project proposed by WDFW's Sinlahekin and Methow Wildlife Areas. This grant proposal is centered upon the restoration of approximately 212 acres of weed-infested, abandoned dryland agricultural fields back to their native shrub-steppe habitat. In their current state, the proposed restoration fields currently act as seed beds for invasive species and provide little to no wildlife benefit. In recognizing that over half of Washington's native shrub-steppe has been lost, we see tremendous value in both preserving current habitats and restoring areas that may otherwise cause adverse effects on surrounding native ecosystems. The Sinlahekin and Methow Wildlife Areas both have nearly 80 years each of sustainable land management and wildland restoration experience and are therefore fully dedicated and capable of restoring native habitats in Okanogan County. 



The Port of Illahee strongly supports Kitsap County Parks plans to expand the Illahee Preserve.

In 2005, the Port obtained a \$268,000 Centennial Clean Water grant from the Department of Ecology to conduct a watershed study within the Port's geographical boundary. That study resulted in findings that support the County's plan to expand the Preserve with an Urban Wildlife Habitat grant.

Specifically, the Port was interested in Illahee Creek as the source of storm water surges, during significant rain events, resulted in large sediment loads going out into the bay and around the Port's dock structure. The Washington Native Plant Society (WNPS) strongly supports the proposal by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to acquire additional priority parcels in the Rattlesnake Mountain Scenic Area in east King County. As an organization committed to protecting Washington's native plants and their habitats, WNPS strongly supports the proposed acquisition.

The purchase of the privately owned property in the Rattlesnake Mountain Scenic Area, which is within the Mountains to Sound Greenway, a 100-mile landscape of forests, wildlife habitat and open spaces along Interstate 90, will protect it from residential development and provide crucial wildlife habitat near urban areas. The distinctive physical features of this site, including mature Douglas fir forests, pockets of old growth forests, snag-rich wildlife habitats, numerous riparian systems, cliffs, steep slopes and wildlife corridors contribute to a varied and developed understory of native plants of Washington.

The Jefferson County Board of County Commissioners is writing this letter in support of Jefferson Land Trust's application for support of the Quimper Wildlife Corridor project to Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program's 2020 Urban Wildlife Habitat grant program. Jefferson County has been working in partnership with Jefferson Land Trust, other agencies and the community on this project since the mid 1990's, and we are excited about these next efforts to preserve additional priority parcels in the Quimper Wildlife Corridor.

The Quimper Wildlife Corridor project is an effort to preserve a 3.5-mile greenbelt of native vegetation that spans the North Quimper Peninsula from Fort Worden State Park within the City of Port Townsend to McCurdy Point and Discovery Bay to the west in rural Jefferson County. The goal of the project is to preserve significant connected undeveloped forest and wetland habitats for multiple wildlife species within the Port Townsend Urban Growth Area and adjacent lands, while protecting the City's largest drainage corridor for natural stormwater filtration and storage. An extensive network of recreational trails crisscross the corridor and are appreciated by community and visitors for walking, bicycling, hiking, horseback riding, connecting neighborhoods, and educational programs for people of all ages.

Historic platting from the 1880s divided most of the land in the QWC into 50x100 foot lots without regard for topography or hydrology, resulting in hundreds of private parcels ranging from one lot to multiple lots. Adjacent development has increased dramatically in the last 20 years. Generational turnover in land ownership is threatening the corridor project while at the same time providing opportunities for acquisition not previously available. Since the inception of the QWC project 25 years ago, Jefferson Land Trust, Jefferson County, and the City of Port Townsend have acquired and preserved over 245 acres with funding provided by the community, The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, Urban Wildlife Habitat Program, Jefferson County Conservation Futures Fund and numerous private foundations. This represents 50 transactions completed by the Land Trust alone. Recent outreach by the Land Trust to 120 landowners of prioritized parcels has resulted in over 30% response expressing interest in selling for the purpose of permanent preservation.

Support from the State Urban Wildlife Habitat Program is critical in this next big phase of acquisitions in the QWC, helping the Land Trust and project partners preserve this critical greenbelt for wildlife and humans to enjoy for years to come. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

To Whom it May Concern:

I'm writing as president of Newcastle Trails to support the acquisition of the forested Dalpay tract containing the DeLeo Wall Viewpoint. We'd like it to become public open space – possibly an addition to Cougar Mountain Regional Wildland Park, which it adjoins on two sides.

Newcastle Trails is a 501(c)3 nonprofit citizens group with more than 350 members. We've worked to preserve and expand Newcastle's trail system since 1999. And we strongly support the preservation of the forest areas adjoining Cougar Mountain Park.

The Dalpay tract is especially important: it includes the much-visited DeLeo Wall Viewpoint, the old DeLeo Wall Trail, and informal trails linking Newcastle to the Park. And it's near the convergence of major Newcastle trails: the CrossTown Trail, running southeast from Bellevue's Newport Hills community past Lake Boren Park and central Newcastle; and the May Creek Greenway, coming east from the Eastrail in Renton (maps on page 2). The Greenway is complete within Newcastle. Renton's segment is complete from Lake Washington to I-405. The final link, under the freeway to Newcastle, awaits the completion of the I-405 Interchange and Transit Center projects in that area.

Cougar Mountain Park serves the greater Seattle region, not just the Eastside. It's an oasis of wilderness (with views and historical sights), much-loved and much-used. Usage will grow as population increases, open space is developed, and mass transit improves.

The Dalpay parcel is already being used as though it were part of the Park. If it's not preserved – if it's logged – we'll all lose. We'll lose the recreational benefits of the parcel, its viewpoint and trails, and the forest area to the west. We'll lose the ecological and esthetic benefits of a forested watershed and viewshed. We'll lose a piece of wilderness – and its trees and trails and animals - while public needs and park usage keep growing.



The Save DeLeo Wall Campaign is a citizen-led effort to prevent clear-cut logging of the "DeLeo Wall" property located in the southeast corner of the City of Newcastle. Our group would like to preserve the DeLeo Wall as green space, ideally as part of the adjacent Cougar Mountain Regional Wildland Park. The Campaign was formed in the spring of 2018 and has worked diligently with the City of Newcastle, King County, Forterra and local trails groups to raise money and awareness of what may happen if the steep hillside is clearcut.

The Save DeLeo Wall Campaign is supported by more than 450 local citizens, Newcastle City Council, Renton City Council, Newcastle Trails, the Issaquah Alps Trails Club, the Washington Native Plant Society Conservation Committee, several local running groups, and the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe. The campaign can be credited with getting 150 citizens to attend a Newcastle City Council meeting in the summer of 2019, the largest single-issue turn out ever. The Campaign recently raised more than \$35,000 towards an appraisal of the property, at the request of the City of Newcastle and Forterra.

We strongly support the City of Newcastle grant application toward an acquisition of the property. If the grant is approved, the funds will be merged with existing city and county grant money.

NOSC has worked in Jefferson County, and the greater North Olympic Peninsula, for three decades. Our deep community roots and expertise in salmon recovery make us well poised to be the point organization responsible for weaving the story of salmon into JUMP.

HJ Carroll Park is adjacent to Chimacum Creek and has a paved trail that provides visitors the opportunity to view spawning salmon. Chimacum Creek is home to coho, steelhead, cutthroat trout, fall chum, and the Endangered Hood Canal Summer Chum. There is a remarkable success story of the community rallying behind the recovery of Summer Chum in Chimacum Creek. In the 1980's, the summer chum population was wiped out due to a culvert washing out and burying all of the summer chum eggs in the lower reaches of the creek. Volunteers and community members took on the successful endeavor of re-introducing chum salmon into Chimacum Creek. We now have active runs of around 1,500 wild fish returning to the creek each year. Youth in our community have the opportunity to observe salmon as they return each year to the creek.

Stories and associated artwork can be incorporated into the JUMP playground. These designs can encourage the youth to reflect on and understand the value of salmon to the watershed and community.







I am writing this letter in support of the Republic Skatepark. I teach students grades 7-12 in the Northern half of the county at Curlew School. Our school is ~50% free and reduced lunch. Our students tend to be athletic, self-sufficient and deprived as far as extra curricular activities. If a student does not play a school sport, there are not many other after school clubs or groups that they can join. There is not a movie theatre, fast food restaurants, a mall or other places where kids can hang out and goof around after school or in the summer. Many students have dirt bikes, ATVs and snowmobiles, but those cost a lot of money and require a lot of upkeep. If we had a skatepark, a kid could just roll down there on their bike or get a basic skateboard.

Nobody likes to talk about this, but especially in the summer, some kids are stuck at home in fairly toxic environments. Ferry county, like many other places, has a fairly severe opioid problem, not to mention the regular pitfalls of alcoholism and other drug use. It would be a lifesaver for some kids to be able to escape that trauma for a bit and find a supportive group at the local skatepark.

Republic has two other parks, one has super old playground equipment and appeals to younger kids and the other tends to just attract people that are interested in hiking and riparian areas. We also have an awesome rail-trail system, but the surface is not conducive to skateboarding. A skatepark would be a good middle ground for gathering and it would prevent skateboarders from getting in trouble and risking their own safety skating around town.

Another advantage of a skatepark, is you might find a different mindset of people than you encounter at other venues. I grew up in Ferry County and did not find a peer group that was welcoming of open-minded people. For kids like me who let their freak flag fly at an early age, I might have found a set of allies and friends who could have supported me during a fairly lonely and ostracized time of my life.

Overall, I can see no negatives of having a skatepark. It provides one more healthy outlet for our local youth and skateboard enthusiasts and it might even draw in local youth from other nearby rural areas.


