The city has a fairly steady population of about 1000 people, while the surrounding county continues to increase in population. Tourism, government and Natural Resources are the dominant industries of the county. However with diminishing natural resource jobs, due to mining and mill closures, Ferry County frequently has the highest unemployment rate in Washington State and a high poverty rate.

As an elected school board director from 2010—2016, Mary was able to compare notes with other small schools in Washington State. Most of these schools had community activities outside of the school for children to participate in such as youth centers, recreation facilities, theater organizations, etc. Republic has no such organized activities. In order to access to such activities, residence must drive over the Canadian border, over mountain passes or across the Columbia river, traveling up to 3 hours. 

I am writing today, as an executive of the Olympia Lacrosse Club board, in support of the purchase of the 83-acre parcel on Yelm Highway that is to be used for future mulit-use play fields that will support the game of lacrosse in Olympia. Part of my role, as VP of OLC, is scheduling field reservations for the 7 youth teams that we currently support. I have firsthand knowledge of the need for additional fields in Olympia that can support the game of lacrosse as it proves difficult, each year, to schedule field use for practices and games given the level of competing need for those field from all of the other youth and adult sports leagues. It is not uncommon to have to put our players on half-sized and even baseball fields due to the lack of dedicated 'lacrosse size' fields in Olympia. Having to practice on these smaller fields limits the skill development of our players and puts them at a disadvantage when playing games with other teams. Lacrosse, in Olympia and the surrounding area, has been offered for just 6 years and still in its early growth phase. Lacrosse is the fastest growing youth sport nation wide in both boys and girls teams and OLC has growth plans to support 12 to 15 teams in the coming years. Our organization deeply appreciates the importance of parks to our neighborhoods' physical health and mental well-being. We urge positive consideration for this request which is supported by the following facts:

- The Olympia community identified the need for a community park, which would include soccer fields, in both the 2010 and 2016 Parks, Arts and Recreation Plans This property was identified as the preferred site for a future community park in a 2014 Community Park Suitability Assessment.
- There are currently no dedicated soccer fields in Olympia's park system and the last athletic-field complex constructed in Olympia was Yauger Park in 1982.

The Friends of LBA Woods is a volunteer stewardship group under the aegis of the City of Olympia's Parks Stewardship Program. The Friends of LBA Woods represents the many members of the Olympia-area community who successfully campaigned in 2012-2017 to save the LBA Woods as public parkland, to support ongoing stewardship of this parkland, and to pass the 2015 Metropolitan Parks District measure. Between 2017 and 2020, we hosted or co-hosted 27 work parties and offered more than a dozen guided nature walks in the LBA Woods.

We are committed to supporting our parks for the physical and mental well-being of our community, especially now as public outdoor spaces—even without full access to amenities—are playing an increasingly critical role in maintaining the health of communities during difficult times.

With this letter, the Friends of LBA Woods fully supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications for projects (described below), all of which align with the goals of the City's 2016 Parks Plan but also comport with the overarching goal of *Sustainable Thurston* (Thurston County Regional Planning Council, 2013), which states that "A sustainable community will enhance quality of life, foster economic vitality, and protect the environment while balancing our needs today with those of future residents."

Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition

Funding assistance is essential for the acquisition of the multi-use park Olympia that will satisfy Olympia's long-standing, oft-stated, and well-supported need for dedicated standard-size soccer fields. Careful, thoughtful design and construction of this park promises to be rightfully costly as the current master plan concept plans aim to aesthetically integrate soccer fields, parking areas, areas of protected natural wetlands and forested groves, play areas, and potentially community gardens, bike skills area, nature trails, sports loops, and open fields. Given that this long-awaited park will serve the larger Thurston County community (and likely beyond), the recreation value is especially great and should be supported through larger-than-Olympia funding resources.

Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development

The acquisition of this 67-acre parcel helps balance the type of park available on Olympia's west side. Like LBA Woods, the Kaiser Woods parcel offers trails through mature upland forest and

varied terrain valued by both hikers, walkers, and mountain bikers. The development plans for this park have garnered heavy and lively interest from the public. The Olympia Parks Department is taking great care to develop this park with sensitivity to the natural environment, the various needs of the potential park users, and the neighboring land owners. This exemplary level of kind of care should be supported through grant funding.

LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

Though only 40 years old, the decrepitude of the LBA Park ballfield #2 cannot be overstated. It is unsafe for use and needs a total renovation and improved features to meet ADA standards to be useful for play and inclusive for all.

Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition

Neighborhood parks make a significant contribution to the quality of life in Olympia. This corner of the north-east quadrant of Olympia is currently underserved by parks. The need for a park in the Lilly Road area was identified as a community need in the 2004 Parks Plan. With the projected increased population growth of Olympia and its Urban Growth Area, this is a timely and important acquisition and one that would help meet the 2016 Parks Plan goal of having a park within one-half mile of every residence.

We write as a member of the YES Olympia Parks that successfully advocated for the establishment of the Olympia Municipal Parks District and advocates for parks, trails, and recreation projects generally.

To this end, Friends of the Waterfront supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications as follows.

Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition

- Olympia currently has no standard soccer fields. Passage of our second voted parks funding measure has provided the wherewithal to tackle this serious deficiency. The soccer fields in this project will serve not just soccer games but also other sports that need rectangular fields such as youth football, ultimate frisbee, and lacrosse. It will also serve participants from all of Thurston County, not just Olympia.
- This project is now in the master planning stage, including a great deal of community involvement. It will be very expensive and will be constructed in stages over a number of years. Funding assistance from the state will be vital.

Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development

• This project, now in the master planning stage, will provide for both mountain bike trails and hiking trails in Kaiser Woods. There has

been very heavy interest in this project from local mountain biking enthusiasts who have participated in large numbers in the planning process.

• Care is being taken to preserve the natural character of this wooded property.

LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

- The LBA Park ballfields were developed over 40 years ago. All aspects of Field #2 are in such poor condition that this field cannot be used due to safety concerns. This puts a strain on the city's other fields.
- Field #2 will be completely renovated, including new ADA features. It will serve the needs of youth teams.

Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition

- Olympia's Parks Plan calls for neighborhood parks within one-half mile of every residence, which is considered a comfortable walking distance and is intended to both increase walking and decrease vehicle use. This standard has become ever more important as residential zoning becomes denser to accommodate increased population within the current Urban growth Area in compliance with the state Growth Management Act.
- The Lilly Road area does not presently have a neighborhood park. Neighborhood parks contain a variety of facilities to serve family recreation needs, such as children's playgrounds, picnic areas, and restrooms.

I write in support of The City of Olympia's application for funding two ongoing projects: the Yelm Highway Community Park and Kaiser Woods Park. Our organization, Native Plant Salvage Foundation, has been working to protect and conserve habitat and water resources in South Puget Sound for over 20 years. These City initiatives directly support our preservation mission.

We encourage you to support the City of Olympia by awarding the grants requested for these projects. Maintaining natural habitat benefits the community in many ways, from direct benefits to wildlife and the native plants that support them, to providing areas for people to enjoy nature—thereby offering both opportunities for nature-based education and engendering appreciation for native ecosystems and sustainable landscaping. Having locations such Kaiser Woods Park fosters appreciation of nature and encourages people to protect the environment.

Moreover, the native and waterwise landscapes associated with these parks projects will support water-quality protection by intercepting and filtering stormwater, and enhancing water quantity by slowing down rainwater and allowing it time to percolate back into our critical groundwater aquifers. These parks projects will protect these large parcels by preventing the impacts of widespread clearing, grading, and paving—thereby retaining pervious soils needed to protect local waterways, groundwater, and the Salish Sea.

Although a portion of the Yelm Highway Community Park would be developed for recreational sports fields and associated services, this area had previously been used for farm land, so there will be no significant change in soil structure and stormwatermanagement benefits (and possibly *improved water quality* by reducing farm-related pollution inputs). Additionally, **substantial acreage** of natural areas within the park will be maintained with the same benefits as Kaiser Woods Park. These areas contain native Gary Oak habitat and wetlands, both critical resources to preserve.

As development continues to progress in South Sound, we are losing many of our natural areas and Native Plant Salvage Foundation appreciates efforts such as these to protect diminishing undeveloped lands. We hope to see these projects move forward, and strongly encourage you to support the City of Olympia's applications.

Olympia United Soccer Club (OUSC) fully endorses the grant application made by City of Olympia for funding on the 83-acre parcel on Yelm Highway.

The need for Olympia park space with playable athletic fields is significant. A mix of lighted, synthetic fields and grass fields will provide greater access to sports and recreation for young athletes in our community.

OUSC is a youth recreation soccer club. Our players range from 3-18 years of age with greater than 95% residing within the Olympia School District boundary area. In 2009, OUSC had 1236 players registered into our soccer programs. In 2019, we had 2626 athletes playing in our soccer programs. In the past 10 years our player numbers have more than doubled. However, since there has been no increase in field resources in that time, we have been left scrambling for large rectangular grass spaces on which to hold practices and games.

For the first time in our history, we were forced to close our spring 2020 registration after two weeks and turn players away because we simply lack field resources to register additional teams. Our teams all "share" practices spaces and we utilize every space in Olympia that is available to us. This simply is just not enough space for the demand for soccer fields.

The City of Olympia does not maintain one single dedicated soccer field in any city park. Thus, our programs are nearly 100% dependent on Olympia School fields for practices and games. The pressure on our limited community resources is significant, especially during the spring and fall seasons. This has an enormous impact on grass fields that are often heavily utilized in rainy, inclement weather.

Lighted, turf fields will greatly improve community access to recreation and organized sports during all seasons of play. Additional grass fields will allow for fields to be rotated out of service to improve their usability during the season and take some pressure off our limited Olympia inventory

Olympia United is happy to lend our enthusiastic support to the Yelm Highway Park project and support the installment of long-overdue soccer fields. We look forward to this project's completion and watching young athletes utilizing the space.

Olympia Parks and Rec worked with us to find the best field situation to use. I quickly found out that soccer field space was very difficult to acquire. All spaces that looked like a soccer field were all booked solid. Even secondary facilities that seemed like alternatives to soccer fields were heavily used by other sports groups and organizations. Although not ideal, we have been very fortunate to have found a space. I have also seen this community being very creative with using any flat patches of grass. Some of these clearly were not originally planned on being utilized for sports space. I credit our local school districts and Olympia Parks and Recreation for maximizing facility use. Since arriving at this YMCA and this community 3 years ago, I have found it very difficult to establish a soccer program that provides ideal facilities. I know that we often are in a bit of a cueing line for access to facilities throughout the year due to lack of field availability. This is especially true during the Fall and Winter seasons.

- The Olympia community identified the need for a community park, which would include soccer fields, in both the 2010 and 2016 Olympia Parks, Arts and Recreation Plans. And the Yelm Highway property was identified as the preferred site for a future community park in the 2014 Community Park Suitability Assessment.

The Friends of LBA Woods is a volunteer stewardship group under the aegis of the City of Olympia's Parks Stewardship Program. The Friends of LBA Woods represents the many members of the Olympia-area community who successfully campaigned in 2012-2017 to save the LBA Woods as public parkland, to support ongoing stewardship of this parkland, and to pass the 2015 Metropolitan Parks District measure. Between 2017 and 2020, we hosted or co-hosted 27 work parties and offered more than a dozen guided nature walks in the LBA Woods.

We are committed to supporting our parks for the physical and mental well-being of our community, especially now as public outdoor spaces—even without full access to amenities—are playing an increasingly critical role in maintaining the health of communities during difficult times.

With this letter, the Friends of LBA Woods fully supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications for projects (described below), all of which align with the goals of the City's 2016 Parks Plan but also comport with the overarching goal of *Sustainable Thurston* (Thurston County Regional Planning Council, 2013), which states that "A sustainable community will enhance quality of life, foster economic vitality, and protect the environment while balancing our needs today with those of future residents."

Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition

Funding assistance is essential for the acquisition of the multi-use park Olympia that will satisfy Olympia's long-standing, oft-stated, and well-supported need for dedicated standard-size soccer fields. Careful, thoughtful design and construction of this park promises to be rightfully costly as the current master plan concept plans aim to aesthetically integrate soccer fields, parking areas, areas of protected natural wetlands and forested groves, play areas, and potentially community gardens, bike skills area, nature trails, sports loops, and open fields. Given that this long-awaited park will serve the larger Thurston County community (and likely beyond), the recreation value is especially great and should be supported through larger-than-Olympia funding resources.

Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development

LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

Though only 40 years old, the decrepitude of the LBA Park ballfield #2 cannot be overstated. It is unsafe for use and needs a total renovation and improved features to meet ADA standards to be useful for play and inclusive for all.

Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition

Neighborhood parks make a significant contribution to the quality of life in Olympia. This corner of the north-east quadrant of Olympia is currently underserved by parks. The need for a park in the Lilly Road area was identified as a community need in the 2004 Parks Plan. With the projected increased population growth of Olympia and its Urban Growth Area, this is a timely and important acquisition and one that would help meet the 2016 Parks Plan goal of having a park within one-half mile of every residence.

- Field #2 will be completely renovated, including new ADA features. It will serve the needs of youth teams.

- Olympia's Parks Plan calls for neighborhood parks within one-half mile of every residence, which is considered a comfortable walking distance and is intended to both increase walking and decrease vehicle use. This standard has become ever more important as residential zoning becomes denser to accommodate increased population within the current Urban growth Area in compliance with the state Growth Management Act.
- The Lilly Road area does not presently have a neighborhood park. Neighborhood parks contain a variety of facilities to serve family recreation needs, such as children's playgrounds, picnic areas, and restrooms.

I am writing on behalf of Bethel Community Services to convey our support of an expansion of Sprinker Recreation Center, one that will include designs to improve outdoor features, which will greatly benefit Spanaway, Parkland and much of Pierce County.

Bethel Community Services is working to build a community of healthy families in Bethel School District, a sprawling rural community comprised of 202 square miles in unincorporated Pierce County. A recent study revealed that there were 105,000 residents living in the district, with an enrollment in Bethel schools of 20,000 students. To Whom it May Concern,

We are the community living in the Dakota, Columbia Gardens, and Courtland Place apartment buildings. We composed the contents of this letter at a People's Academy for Community Engagement Pop-Up on Friday November 22nd, led by Dakota resident Angela Davis and PACE Coordinator Hilary Nichols. This letter will describe the problems experienced by pedestrians in the neighborhood at the intersection 34th and Charlestown.

Issues experienced at 34th and Charlestown:

- It's very unsafe for seniors and people with disabilities
- Cars can't see pedestrians
- Vehicles park in front of the yellow ramp, which makes it very difficult for people in wheelchairs to get to the grocery store
- Cars do not stop at 34th
- Cars go too fast along Charlestown
- Crossing area is poorly lit
- There is uneven pavement

Personal stories about crossing 34th and Charlestown:

- Last year, my neighbor was killed at 34th and Charlestown.
- I have low vision, so I can't see how to cross safely.
- I've seen my friend in a wheelchair almost get hit several times. I don't send my 16-year-old son over for groceries because I fear for his safety.
- Last week, I was going down the sidewalk in my wheelchair from my apartment and it was dark the whole way. A car came out of the Safeway driveway so fast that it came within one foot of hitting me.
- When I take my kids to school, cars are going over the speed limit.
- We have to raise our hands while walking across the intersection just so cars can see us.
- One day I was with my kids, and my boy almost got hit. There's no enforcement of speeding cars.
- Walking to Safeway, an older lady with a cane almost got hit. If I hadn't moved her, she would've been hit.
- There are new apartments coming to the block, so this is about to be an even bigger problem.
- 2 people have died on Charlestown. We're tired of our friends dying.



Proposed Solutions

- Install a blinking light crosswalk
- Install a permanent "Stop for Pedestrians" sign
- Install a permanent "Seniors and Children Crossing" sign
- Install a stop sign on 34th at Charlestown
- Install a temporary (aka lawn sign) "Stop for Pedestrians" sign
- Provide tall flags for people to put on their mobility devices
- Install crossing flags like at school crosswalks
- Install additional streetlights at 34th and Charlestown
- Support hiring a crossing guard for seniors
- Reduce the speed limit on Charlestown

The 'Save Our Marsh' community group in Edmonds, WA supports the Marina Beach Park renovation grant applications (PRISM #20-1296 and #1322) from the City of Edmonds because they are a critical component of the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary Restoration Project to restore a fully functional tidal wetland along Puget Sound.

The Edmonds Marsh-Estuary has been partially disconnected from Puget Sound since the 1960's when the tidal outlet was put into a 1,600-foot pipe (with a tide gate) that discharges underwater into Puget Sound. Although the tide gate is secured open in spring and summer to allow limited tidal exchange, the fall and winter exclusion of saltwater into the marsh-estuary for many years has created a dysfunctional tidal wetland ecosystem with poor circulation. The long pipe exiting into saltwater below low tide levels has prevented adult salmon from spawning in upland streams, and has prevented juvenile Chinook salmon from rearing and feeding in an estuary.

There is substantial community support for this restoration project. Many residents and visitors to Edmonds go to the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary and Marina Beach Park to enjoy the natural setting and the recreational and wildlife viewing opportunities. The north edge of the Marsh has observation platforms and a boardwalk that provide excellent viewing opportunities. Over 190 different bird species have been documented at the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary and the restoration project will enhance the estuarine habitat for shorebirds as well as aquatic species. Both coho and chum salmon were observed in the past in the streams draining into the marsh and the Edmonds community is united in its desire to bring salmon back for future generations to enjoy.

The renovation design proposed for Marina Beach Park will allow the public to view adult salmon migrating up the tidal channel. There is a very limited number of publicly accessible locations for people to see wild salmon in their natural setting, and this project will greatly add to the public's wildlife viewing and educational opportunities.

We urge the RCO to approve the grant funding requested that will benefit salmon, wildlife, and people throughout the State that appreciate access to our natural resources.

For 30 years we have supported salmon recovery by connecting people with our watersheds through interactive education, hands-on stewardship, and state-of-the-art habitat restoration in partnership with our local community groups, Tribes, governments, agencies, businesses, and landowners in the Stillaguamish, Snohomish, Camano/South Whidbey Island, and southwest Snohomish County watersheds.

SSS operates the Willow Creek Salmon and Watershed Education Center (WCSWEC) that was originally founded over 30 years ago as the Willow Creek Salmon Hatchery and Aquatic Education Center by the Edmonds based Laebugten Salmon Club as a place where the local community could learn about the salmon life cycle and appreciate the need for salmon conservation to support a robust fishery for generations to come. Over those 30+ years three generations of the local community have gotten up close and personal with juvenile coho through helping with their rearing at the hatchery and release into local streams and participating in classroom and outdoor salmon education programs. Known locally as "the Hatchery" it is an Edmonds tradition that Sound Salmon Solutions was honored to be asked to carry on in 2017 when we were invited to assume the lease and operations of the facility.

The City's proposed project is an essential component of the Edmonds Marsh near-shore restoration, which has been popular with the community for decades. This project will reconnect Puget Sound to the estuary marsh by restoring Willow Creek. Willow Creek is an historically salmon-bearing stream currently being piped underground through the park. Just north of the park, the creek will connect with the Edmonds Marsh to return tidal flows, saltwater exchange, and salmon to the marsh.

Once Willow Creek is connected to the sound that allows for fish passage, we will seek permits from WDFW to begin releases of coho juveniles into Willow Creek in hopes of having returns to spawn. We currently have permits to release into other local Edmonds watersheds, mainly Shell Creek.

We also welcome the physical connection between the nearshore habitat and riparian habitat at Willow Creek that passes through the Edmonds Marsh that will provide the community an intimate experience of the key habitats crucial to salmon including stunning views of salmon runs from multiple angles within the park as they head up stream toward WCSWEC to spawn. The community's overall sense of place will be enhanced with new and improved amenities including an all-abilities playground, nature play area, accessible scenic overlooks, dog park, a hand boat launch access point, and restrooms at two new entry plazas. As well, safety and flood prevention will be improved through consolidated parking lots and pedestrian pathways.

Sound Salmon Solutions is pleased to enthusiastically support the City of Edmonds' efforts to redevelop Marina Beach Park to reconnect people with Willow Creek while preserving the community's sense of place and the park's natural beauty. Students Saving Salmon club from Edmonds-Woodway High School and Meadowdale High School support the Marina Beach Park renovation grant applications (PRISM #20-1296 and #1322) because it will reopen a tidal channel between the beach and the Edmonds Marsh-Estuary that will allow salmon to once again return to Edmonds streams.

Students Saving Salmon was formed in 2014 by students concerned about the environment, especially salmon and their habitat, and our goal is to return salmon to all of the streams in Edmonds. Students participate in field studies to collect and disseminate scientific information; conduct community outreach, and assist community salmon enhancement and habitat restoration efforts.

We have collected data on water quality, pollutants and habitat conditions in the Edmonds Marsh and its' tributary streams since 2015 that confirm that restoring open tidal exchange is critical for the health of the Marsh-Estuary and return of salmon. Conditions in the Marsh-Estuary have deteriorated since the 1960's when the estuary outlet was put into a 1,600-foot underground pipe with a tide gate that has prevented tidal exchange causing sedimentation backup, proliferation of invasive species, restricted water circulation, overheating, and total blockage of salmon migration.

This project will contribute to Washington State goals to restore the nearshore environment in Puget Sound for salmon and other aquatic and wildlife species, and we urge the RCO to approve the applications.

The Spokane River Forum enthusiastically supports the City of Spokane Valley application to the Recreation Conservation Office (RCO) for funding to support acquisition of an undeveloped 45-acre riverfront parcel entitled Flora Road Property. Our understanding is that the Washington Department of Transportation has identified this as surplus property for sale. It is also adjacent to property owned by Washington State Parks.

The Spokane River Forum (the Forum) began development of the Spokane River Water Trail (<u>www.spokanewatertrail.org</u>) in 2010. Working with government, private and non-profit partners, 14 access points have been developed or restored. In Spokane Valley, this includes access points at Barker Road, Sullivan Park, Mirabeau Park and Islands Trailhead. These efforts have resulted in two exceptional outcomes:

- 1) Parking lots are full on weekends as hundreds of people now visit the river for rafting, tubing, angling, and paddling at various times of the year.
- 2) Riparian habitat is better protected because people are directed to well maintained access points rather than harming shoreline areas by scrabbling up and down to find their way to the river.

For Forum priorities, the property has unique and highly desirable opportunities that include:

- 1) The wooded, riparian shoreline should be maintained and made accessible to the community. Particularly as the Valley continues to grow, the importance of protecting public spaces can not be understated.
- This river reach has natural features that support a whitewater play area. This includes Mini Climax Wave, Duplex Wave, Sullivan Hole and Zoo Wave. Access at this location would strongly support unique playboater interests.
- Development of a north side Centennial loop trail connecting this property with Sullivan Park access would also support whitewater play usage, hosting of whitewater events, and provide additional recreation opportunities such as walking and biking.

The Forum is committed to participating in a City of Spokane Valley led public master plan process to determine an overall development plan, including considering other amenities such as disc golf and picnic shelters. Unfortunately, Gig Harbor's recent explosive growth has left pickleball players with too few courts. We have 0 (zero) dedicated courts, a ridiculous fact considering our number of players and that pickleball was invented here in Washington and is being considered to become the state game.

We feel the sports complex is a priority and must be completed sooner rather than later. There needs to be special attention to the pickleball courts. These 6 (preferably 8) courts should be included in phase 1A because our players have only one outdoor venue (Sehmel Homestead Park) where we need to bring our own nets and share courts with tennis players and basketball players. Having dedicated courts will give us the potential to contribute financially to the project by holding tournaments as fundraising events. Because our present outdoor courts are not playable during the multitude of PNW wet days, we hope you will consider a roof over the new dedicated courts which is something that we will be again more than willing to contribute to.

As a former Olympia Mayor and public policy analyst, I believe I have a thorough understanding of the importance of parks to Olympia's quality of life now and in the future.

Since the passage of the Washington Growth Management Act 30 years ago, there has been a steady increase in allowed housing densities accompanied by a decrease in minimum lot sizes. In the past two legislative sessions, really large increases in housing densities across the board were passed.

The result is that back yards have become smaller, meaning that neighborhood parks have become even more important. This need for more neighborhood parks has added to the preexisting deficits for major maintenance and additional parks in other categories.

Olympia's applications for funding of the following four projects are intended to address this situation:

The Friends of LBA Woods is a volunteer stewardship group under the aegis of the City of Olympia's Parks Stewardship Program. The Friends of LBA Woods represents the many members of the Olympia-area community who successfully campaigned in 2012-2017 to save the LBA Woods as public parkland, to support ongoing stewardship of this parkland, and to pass the 2015 Metropolitan Parks District measure. Between 2017 and 2020, we hosted or co-hosted 27 work parties and offered more than a dozen guided nature walks in the LBA Woods.

We are committed to supporting our parks for the physical and mental well-being of our community, especially now as public outdoor spaces—even without full access to amenities—are playing an increasingly critical role in maintaining the health of communities during difficult times.

With this letter, the Friends of LBA Woods fully supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications for projects (described below), all of which align with the goals of the City's 2016 Parks Plan but also comport with the overarching goal of *Sustainable Thurston* (Thurston County Regional Planning Council, 2013), which states that "A sustainable community will enhance quality of life, foster economic vitality, and protect the environment while balancing our needs today with those of future residents."

Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition

Funding assistance is essential for the acquisition of the multi-use park Olympia that will satisfy Olympia's long-standing, oft-stated, and well-supported need for dedicated standard-size soccer fields. Careful, thoughtful design and construction of this park promises to be rightfully costly as the current master plan concept plans aim to aesthetically integrate soccer fields, parking areas, areas of protected natural wetlands and forested groves, play areas, and potentially community gardens, bike skills area, nature trails, sports loops, and open fields. Given that this long-awaited park will serve the larger Thurston County community (and likely beyond), the recreation value is especially great and should be supported through larger-than-Olympia funding resources.

Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development

The acquisition of this 67-acre parcel helps balance the type of park available on Olympia's west side. Like LBA Woods, the Kaiser Woods parcel offers trails through mature upland forest and

varied terrain valued by both hikers, walkers, and mountain bikers. The development plans for this park have garnered heavy and lively interest from the public. The Olympia Parks Department is taking great care to develop this park with sensitivity to the natural environment, the various needs of the potential park users, and the neighboring land owners. This exemplary level of kind of care should be supported through grant funding.

LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

Though only 40 years old, the decrepitude of the LBA Park ballfield #2 cannot be overstated. It is unsafe for use and needs a total renovation and improved features to meet ADA standards to be useful for play and inclusive for all.

Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition

Neighborhood parks make a significant contribution to the quality of life in Olympia. This corner of the north-east quadrant of Olympia is currently underserved by parks. The need for a park in the Lilly Road area was identified as a community need in the 2004 Parks Plan. With the projected increased population growth of Olympia and its Urban Growth Area, this is a timely and important acquisition and one that would help meet the 2016 Parks Plan goal of having a park within one-half mile of every residence.

We see the Olympia waterfront area, including waterfront parks and trails, as a treasure for the greater Olympia area. We advocate that the shoreline area be managed for the greatest long term net benefit to the entire community.

We write as a member of the YES Olympia Parks that successfully advocated for the establishment of the Olympia Municipal Parks District and advocates for parks, trails, and recreation projects generally.

To this end, Friends of the Waterfront supports the City of Olympia's four 2020 grant applications as follows.

Yelm Highway Community Park Acquisition

- Olympia currently has no standard soccer fields. Passage of our second voted parks funding measure has provided the wherewithal to tackle this serious deficiency. The soccer fields in this project will serve not just soccer games but also other sports that need rectangular fields such as youth football, ultimate frisbee, and lacrosse. It will also serve participants from all of Thurston County, not just Olympia.
- This project is now in the master planning stage, including a great deal of community involvement. It will be very expensive and will be constructed in stages over a number of years. Funding assistance from the state will be vital.

Kaiser Woods Park Acquisition and Development

• This project, now in the master planning stage, will provide for both mountain bike trails and hiking trails in Kaiser Woods. There has

been very heavy interest in this project from local mountain biking enthusiasts who have participated in large numbers in the planning process.

• Care is being taken to preserve the natural character of this wooded property.

LBA Park Field #2 Renovations

- The LBA Park ballfields were developed over 40 years ago. All aspects of Field #2 are in such poor condition that this field cannot be used due to safety concerns. This puts a strain on the city's other fields.
- Field #2 will be completely renovated, including new ADA features. It will serve the needs of youth teams.

Lilly Road Neighborhood Park Acquisition

- Olympia's Parks Plan calls for neighborhood parks within one-half mile of every residence, which is considered a comfortable walking distance and is intended to both increase walking and decrease vehicle use. This standard has become ever more important as residential zoning becomes denser to accommodate increased population within the current Urban growth Area in compliance with the state Growth Management Act.
- The Lilly Road area does not presently have a neighborhood park. Neighborhood parks contain a variety of facilities to serve family recreation needs, such as children's playgrounds, picnic areas, and restrooms.

I write in support of The City of Olympia's application for funding two ongoing projects: the Yelm Highway Community Park and Kaiser Woods Park. Our organization, Native Plant Salvage Foundation, has been working to protect and conserve habitat and water resources in South Puget Sound for over 20 years. These City initiatives directly support our preservation mission.

We encourage you to support the City of Olympia by awarding the grants requested for these projects. Maintaining natural habitat benefits the community in many ways, from direct benefits to wildlife and the native plants that support them, to providing areas for people to enjoy nature—thereby offering both opportunities for nature-based education and engendering appreciation for native ecosystems and sustainable landscaping. Having locations such Kaiser Woods Park fosters appreciation of nature and encourages people to protect the environment.

Moreover, the native and waterwise landscapes associated with these parks projects will support water-quality protection by intercepting and filtering stormwater, and enhancing water quantity by slowing down rainwater and allowing it time to percolate back into our critical groundwater aquifers. These parks projects will protect these large parcels by preventing the impacts of widespread clearing, grading, and paving—thereby retaining pervious soils needed to protect local waterways, groundwater, and the Salish Sea.

Although a portion of the Yelm Highway Community Park would be developed for recreational sports fields and associated services, this area had previously been used for farm land, so there will be no significant change in soil structure and stormwatermanagement benefits (and possibly *improved water quality* by reducing farm-related pollution inputs). Additionally, **substantial acreage** of natural areas within the park will be maintained with the same benefits as Kaiser Woods Park. These areas contain native Gary Oak habitat and wetlands, both critical resources to preserve.

As development continues to progress in South Sound, we are losing many of our natural areas and Native Plant Salvage Foundation appreciates efforts such as these to protect diminishing undeveloped lands. We hope to see these projects move forward, and strongly encourage you to support the City of Olympia's applications.

I am pleased to support the City of Auburn's grant application as it related to the Jacobson Tree Farm site on Auburn Lea Hill. The City of Auburn, Washington, a city of 80,000 people, has an outstanding parks system but is woefully short of active and passive park space on the East Hill of Auburn. The Auburn School District recognizes the importance of park space as critical to fostering safety and connecting youth with positive activities.

As Auburn continues to grow, we recognize an increased need for quality outdoor space. The Auburn School District has grown tremendously and the student demographics now represent over 40% students of color. Auburn has a large population of single parent families and many kids are transplanted here from other areas. These kids need a safe place to play and develop the skills both athletic and social that are attained with a visit to a park. Teamwork, success and failure are all realized in a park setting. Parks are also critical in helping youth develop, identity, and combat gang activity and unsafe behavior.

The Auburn School District and the City of Auburn Parks, Arts and Recreation Department have been integral partners in implementing comprehensive education/recreation services. The Port of Skagit supports the City of Sedro-Woolley's application to the WA State Recreation and Conservation Office for \$500,000 in funding for the new Olmsted Park.

The Port of Skagit (Port) has been working with the City of Sedro-Woolley (City), Skagit County, Department of Enterprise Services (State), and other public entities since 2013 on adaptive reuse and transfer of ownership of the former Northern State Hospital property, now known as the Sedro-Woolley Innovation for Tomorrow Center (SWIFT Center) from the State to the Port. In 2018 the Port took title to the SWIFT Center and then transferred 14.81 acres of the property to the City of Sedro-Woolley for use as a public park.

The currently underutilized SWIFT Center property will be redeveloped into a center for technology and innovation that will spur economic development and job growth in Sedro-Woolley. The swimming pool has been a sparkling gem in our city since 1934 and with your aid we can continue to keep our pool the glowing heart of our community.

Not only has this gem supplied our community with a place for our families to 'hang out' in the summer, it has taught thousands of children how to swim. With all of the outdoor recreation, such boating, jet skiing, tubing, wind surfing, fishing and other activities, on our local lakes and rivers, I am sure we have saved lives through the skills that have been taught at this facility. It is the highest priority for our community to ensure that no lives are lost due to a lack of swimming skills.

There are multiple positive community benefits that an outdoor swimming pool designed for both recreation and competition can provide for White Salmon. Youth and adults can learn to swim, practice and compete in the local sports of competitive swimming and water polo, enjoy synchronized swimming, become certified in Scuba Diving, become a certified Water Swimming Instructor or Lifeguard, take water aerobics, lap swim for fitness, or just enjoy open play for children and families in a safe environment.

As Head Coach since 2000 for the Hood River Valley Swim Team and Columbia Gorge Masters, I have coached hundreds of children and adults from the entire Columbia River Gorge. There are many swimmers from White Salmon who have to travel across the river in order to participate in competitive swimming. These swimmers have high expectations, and have had much success in the sport. In 2012 Scott Bergstrom, White Salmon native, attended the Swimming Olympic Team Trials in Omaha, Nebraska, competing in the 200m Butterfly (the same event as the well known Michael Phelps). He also received a swimming scholarship to attend the University of Denver. Other White Salmon swimmers have gone on to compete in college, including Justine Rawding at Niagara University and Mariah Rawding Bowdoin College. Brett Rawding used the swimming skills he learned to excel in the underwater egress training course in the Army. Naomi Elyard is pursuing kayaking - she took a semester to tackle high level kayaking challenges while attending classes through the World Class Academy Kayak School. I believe you can see how a local pool supports our local youth in achieving their dreams. Having a pool that supports competition and water sports locally will enable athletes to continue their love of swimming no matter where they go and what they pursue in life.

Competition brings more than just opportunities to the athletes. Swim meets and water polo tournaments bring in much needed dollars to the local economy. These are day &/or weekend long

events with one to two hundred people in attendance. The families stay in local hotels, spend money at the local restaurants and grocery stores, and the support they give goes well beyond the weekend. They go wine tasting and become wine club members to support the wineries through the winter; they love art and return for our Fall Art Walk and our Summer Art and Wine Fusion, they are white water aficionados and come back to raft and kayak on the White Salmon River in the summer. My name is Gina Cabiddu and I currently serve as the Community Manager of Children's Home Society of Washington's Key Peninsula's Family Resource Center. My roles are to direct all the services provided in Pierce and Mason County, forge and maintain connections with community partners, leaders, and elected officials, and raise and manage the budget for the region within our state-wide organization. It is my pleasure to write this letter of support for Key Peninsula Parks and their Washington Recreation Conversation Office grant application for Phase 4 of Gateway Park's development. This project will provide the Key Peninsula community with a lighted turf field at Gateway park, additional parking and restrooms, and a muchneeded safety feature of an additional entrance/exit that is further from the blind highway curve preceding this park.

First, I'll speak to the character of Key Pen Parks. Each member of this team is dynamic, passionate about recreational opportunities, community-oriented, responsive, and accountable. Key Pen Parks and the sites they maintain are community staples and a source of great pride and recreation in our small, rural community. Key Pen Parks is actively engaged with the needs, resources, and partnerships in our area with their energy and longevity in every level of civic engagement. This includes their membership of the Key Peninsula Business Association, hosting traditions of 4th of July hot dog socials and logging shows that honor the history and culture of our area, and grants to community partners that made summer programs in 2019 a reality for under-served youth when other partners closed their facilities abruptly just to name a few examples.

Second, I can speak to the need for park expansions and innovations in this community due to the demographics of our area. Key Peninsula is a rural, isolated community within Pierce County. This leads the parks of the community to be the leading source of recreational entertainment for families in our community. As there is no public transportation on the Key Peninsula, the need for parks within local access is crucial. Not only is commuting to Kitsap County or Tacoma a time burden for families, the gas and bridge toll costs impede families as well. There are schools in Key Peninsula that near 70% free and reduced lunch rates and when the multi-million dollar homes along the waterfront and within Gig Harbor are removed, the average family income plunges to or below the federal poverty line. The lack of transportation and financial resources in addition to the community's poor health outcomes, rates of homelessness, and Child Protective Services investigations set strong context for Key Peninsula being a community of focus for entities such as Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, United Way of Pierce County, and Pierce County's Help Me Grow.

As the needs of the community shift, so does the use of our parks. Key Pen Parks was a leader in addressing the lack of reliable and available internet during COVID's impact by creating WiFI locations. Lastly, within compliance with ordinances and public health, the parks have been a key means of decreasing social isolation and fostering connection with physical distancing through Gateway Park's trails and fields where picnics are held, youth serving agencies convene to work with students with housing insecurity, and agencies host in-person staff meetings to address community needs.

This grant would enhance the community benefits named above, but also would be crucial for strengthening the safety of the site. The entrance/exit currently is positioned next to a blind corner where vehicles are often traveling between 40 and 60 miles per hour leaving little reaction time for those turning out of the park as well as the oncoming traffic. Key Peninsula needs more sidewalks, wider walking pathways along roadsides, and traffic revisions. This grant would answer that need and reduce the number of and potential accident incidents.

The Wahkiakum Board of County Commissioners strongly supports the application submitted by Wahkiakum County Port District No. 2 to the Washington State Recreation Conservation Office. Port District No. 2 operates Vista Park, which is a major recreational and tourist feature within Wahkiakum County. It is a 75-acre park located on the Columbia River and is used extensively by both residents and visitors. Common activities include camping, picnicking, outdoor recreational games and easy beach access with a spectacular river view.

The Port District's proposal would update and expand the current nature trail at Vista Park. This trail is the only walking trail found within Wahkiakum County. We are sending this letter in support of the City of Bellingham's application for a state grant to be used in development of Cordata Park Phase Two. The Park Master Plan includes construction of four outdoor pickleball courts, about which the community is very excited.

Our mission at the nonprofit Bellingham Pickleball Club (BPC) is to promote the development of pickleball skills, facilities, and community in the greater Bellingham area. Started in 2018, we have a quickly growing membership of 300 players, drawn equally between women and men. Another 200 receive our updates, but aren't club members. Local pickleball players include all ages, abilities, and socioeconomic levels. We estimate there are currently 800-1000 local pickleball players, and lots more who come to play from outside of Bellingham and Whatcom County.

The development of four new outdoor courts at Cordata Park would be most welcome and embraced by the pickleball community in Bellingham and surrounding cities. We enthusiastically support the City of Bellingham's application for a Recreation and Conservation Office grant. The city will find these courts quickly becoming a hub of healthy activity for the community at-large, and the neighboring area in particular.

Pickleball demographics in the past were mostly retired persons, but now young children are playing with grandparents, teens & young adults embracing it with vigor, and many working age people enjoying it as a social, fun, and challenging sport. Courts aren't just being used during the day by those who are retired, but also in the evening, weekends, and even lunch hour by those in the younger demographics.

Specific to this grant, Cordata residents have high percentages of senior citizens, young families, community college students, and those of lower socioeconomic status. BPC has already told the park department that we will to offer free beginner clinics when these new courts are built, and provide loaner paddles and balls to get people going. If there is a need, we can also find ways to grant equipment to those who can't afford it, but wish continue with playing.

In community surveys we have conducted, people state that pickleball gives them an increased sense of community, with ongoing opportunities to socialize and have fun, exercise and stay fit, and improve skills for recreational and/or competitive play. In fact, long wait times experienced by players at current venues in Bellingham is a limiting factor in the growth and development of our community focused club. In a PRO PLAN survey conducted in 2019 by the city of Bellingham, hundreds of community members requested more pickleball courts.

This explosive demand for access to high-quality courts is also experienced in other communities across the United States. According to the USA Pickleball Association (USAPA), the number of pickleball venues increased 20% in the years 2018-2019 (from 6,593 to 7,928).

Pickleball is considered one of the fastest growing sports in America, with 3.3 million players (a 10% increase between 2015-2018 according to the Sports & Fitness Industry Association). Membership in the USAPA has doubled in size since 2017. In addition, to retired senior citizens who have played the game since it was invented, the fastest growth rates have been in "younger" players less than 50 years.

As dedicated pickleball players and club leaders, we advocate for the health and wellness benefits of this easy-to-learn and fun sport. Studies are now appearing documenting the positive health benefits of pickleball in terms of improved cardiorespiratory fitness, lower blood pressure, higher social engagement, and reduced depression.

Increased tourism is another documented community benefit of pickleball. When pickleball players travel, they often consult "Places to Play Pickleball", and base their destination on the availability of courts. Additionally, when pickleball players come to visit family members in the Bellingham area, they often want to stay longer when there is access to courts. And day trips from surrounding areas in order to play, is also common. L

The existing court capacity in Bellingham is already being maxed out. Last summer it was common to have 60 people waiting to play. With the fast growth of the sport and outreach by BPC, we believe that the pickleball courts at Cordata Community Park will quickly become a treasured place of activity and social connection for a wide spectrum of ages, abilities, and socio-economic status. We know that often populations of children—particularly children from low-income families and children of color—are less likely to have to access to outdoor recreation and play. In Bellingham, children who live in apartments and/or have parents who work beyond the school day have more limited opportunities to play and exercise outside, either due to lack of proximity to outdoor spaces, or an expectation to stay inside until their parents come home from work.

Although Bellingham is surrounded by natural beauty, with the Salish Sea to the west and the foothills of Mt. Baker to the east, children in our community have inequitable access to enjoying the recreation opportunities that are so close. Improving trail systems and building neighborhood parks in areas near housing where children live is a key to improving the health and well-being of an entire generation.

Our district supports the efforts of our community partners like the City of Bellingham to make our community a healthier and more livable location for all our children, families and community members.

The Highpoint Exit 20 on I-90 is being envisioned as a kind of a "Gateway to the Outdoors" as it is located at the eastern edges of the Seattle-Bellevue-Issaquah metropolitan areas, just 20 miles from downtown Seattle, and provides access to thousands of acres of public forests on both sides of the highway.

Hundreds of thousands of visitors including families and school groups come each year to hike, walk, and/or attend educational tours on Tradition Plateau and West Tiger Mountain on the South Side of the highway as well to hike, bike and horseback ride in Grand Ridge Park and on a regional trail on the north side of the highway. The existing trailhead facilities cannot accommodate the growing use levels so people park along the frontage roads to access the forests. The Back Country Horsemen of Whatcom County (BCHW) has a long history of volunteering with trail work projects in various parts of Washington State. One of those places has been, for over 35 years, Blanchard State Forest. Blanchard is a lowland all year riding, hiking, biking, hang gliding non-motorized recreation site frequented by folks from Canada to Olympia. Additionally I have been a member of the original Blanchard Mountain Strategies Group that was formed by then Commissioner Doug Sutherland in 2006 and the Blanchard Mountain Advisory Committee that was formed shortly after the Strategies Agreement was signed in 2008 and continues in that role today. I have been riding my horse, working on the Blanchard Trails, packing in materials and gear for over 35 years. In 2019 the BCHW, Whatcom, recorded 2014 hours of volunteer trail work with a dollar value of \$131,304.71 dollars.

The increase in recreational use of the Blanchard State Forest is easily seen by those of us with a long history of this place. The parking lots now are increasingly full. Meeting folks on the trail enjoying this special place is now the norm where it was once the exception. With this increase in use comes debris along the trail and behind the trees. The only pit toilets are at the lower trailhead and at the Overlook parking area. As residents of the Skykomish Valley and avid outdoorspeople, we are writing this letter of support for the Department of Natural Resource's Boulder Lake RCO grant request.

Our organization, Sky Valley Future, supports investing in trail infrastructure in the Skykomish River Valley to create long-term economic stability based on our growing tourism economy.

We know that trails help support a healthy economy. According to the RCO's recent study, the direct economic value of the Lake Serene trail is estimated at \$834,000 annually.¹ We need more similar trails in the Skykomish Valley. Snohomish County continues to grow, yet its trail-based recreation lags behind neighboring counties: Snohomish County currently sees only \$106M/year from trail-based recreation, compared to King County at over \$490M, and Skagit county at \$214M. Chelan County sees nearly \$300M, with many people driving through the Skykomish Valley to get there. Improving non-motorized access by reopening existing trails through this grant would create benefits for trail users as well as the economy of the local community.

As Chair of the State Forest Committee of the Sierra Club's Washington State Chapter I would like to submit the following letter of support for the Department of Natural Resource's Boulder Lake RCO grant request.

The Sierra Club mission is to protect and restore the quality of the natural environment. The club has approximately 35,000 members in the State of Washington and we encourage our membership to explore, enjoy and protect the planet.

For years, the Sierra Club has worked to protect and expand the Morning Star NRCA -both for its ecological significance as well as its recreational potential. Over this time, we have been concerned that due to budget priorities, the DNR has not been able to maintain the existing Morning Star NRCA trail system and adequately protect Morning Star NRCA in some areas from significant resource damage. Our concerned peaked with the closing of the popular trail to Boulder Lake on two counts: (1) the damage to the trail from natural events and (2) damage to the sensitive areas from visitors use. One of the consequences of this trail closure was to create a spillover effect possibly leading to resource damage in other locations from overuse to those trails

These concerns were brought to the attention of the Club and resulted in our support for a previous RCO grant to start a Morning Star NRCA Advisory group to evaluate recreation opportunities and potential future trail strategies in the Morning Star NRCA. I was also selected to be a member of the board.

Rather than looking for new trail opportunities, the board studied ways to restore and repair neglected and overcrowded existing trails as well as recently closed Boulder Lake Trail. The advisory board also spent the best part of a year trying to prioritize which trails in Morning Star NRCA should be prioritized for grant funding. The sad truth was that all the trails in Morning Star NRCA have suffered from a lack of funding. Therefore, selecting two trails to submit grant proposals was difficult. However, the decision centered on reopening existing trails, as well as eliminating resource damage in sensitive areas. The Boulder Lake Trail proposal was selected as one of the two proposals for potential grants (the other proposal was the Gothic Basin Trail which the Club also supports). There are several reasons why we support this particular grant.

1. The need to Increase Non-Motorized Recreation in Skykomish Valley

Even before the uptick in hikers due to Covid-19, the trails near the middle portion of the Skykomish Valley were significantly over crowded. For example, Wallace Falls State Park sees over 225,000 visits per year and on many days, the parking lot, which holds only 100 spaces, is filled by midmorning. This results in visitors parking along the road that causes traffic problems, and conflicts with local residents. Those who visit the park have long complained that the overcrowding on the trails causes resource damage to the park and degrades the outdoor experience of the user. The outcome is that many potential hikers choose to recreate elsewhere. Similar problems exist a few miles up the road at Lake Serene. Trail. These overuse issues have gotten significantly worst over the last 10 years. Meanwhile the population of Snohomish County and eastern King County will continue to grow.

2. Re opening the Boulder Lake Trail will provide 2 recreational experiences.

The first is a beautiful low elevation walk on a road to trail conversion with outstanding views and cool forests leading to as much as a 10-mile round trip hike. The second is a 16-mile round trip to the secluded lake that has possibilities for a further day-long hikes or an overnight backpack.

3. Utilizing grant money to rebuild the trail would also benefit local communities.

Over the last few years the towns along the Highway 2 corridor have been embracing the economic benefits of outdoor recreation. Not only will this trail and campground meet those needs but also rebuilding the trail will increase recreational potential along Highway 2 without leading to the traffic congestion issues along the highway segment east of Sultan.

4. Rebuilding the trail will disperse recreation away from other over used trails like Wallace Falls State Park

5. Funding this grant will also lesson the backlog of neglected trails in Morning Star which can enable the advisory board to focus on other trails in Morning Star NRCA so they can receive the attention they need

Beside recreation, the Club is also interested in supporting this grant because the goals expressed in the grant match the Club's interest in habitat protection and the appropriate use of the resource. Please accept our support for the Boulder Lake Trail grant.

One of the best bird-viewing trails in Thurston County, the McLane Creek Trail is very close to the wetland but associated shrubs and trees provide excellent cover for birders to walk there with only minimal disturbance to birdlife. It's one of the best teaching settings in the region because of the trails' access to the diverse habitats in the McLane trail complex.

Observing the growth of the Wood Duck and Mallard families and the turtles and newts on the pond, especially from the path for the proposed boardwalk replacement, will give school groups an opportunity to see relatable wildlife close-up, without harming the sensitive aquatic areas, and in safety. Black Hills Audubon strongly supports the grant for the McLane Creek Boardwalk Replacement. McLane is a special place; we need to invest in its preservation and the opportunities for education and enjoyment that it provides.
