Pacific Coast Salmon Coalition Creating a Salmon Camp for Middle Schoolers

Grant Awarded: \$24,978

The Pacific Coast Salmon Coalition will use this grant to create a summer camp program, called Salmon Camp, for Forks Middle School students. The camp will engage kids in a variety of outdoor activities, including fishing, hiking, restoring habitat, identifying and dissecting plants and animals, and journaling and photographing. The camp will run each summer for two years, with the goal of expanding it to other age groups. The camp will be designed to get children outside and enjoying nature, use salmon as a catalyst to encourage students to connect to the community, and teach students to be environmental stewards. Republic School District Enhancing an Outdoor Education Program

Grant Awarded: \$25,000

The Republic School District will use this grant to expand and improve its Republic Outdoor Adventure Ranger (ROAR) program, which provides about 170 kids, age five to twelve, with outdoor recreation and environmental education. The grant will pay for program implementation, staff, recreational equipment and supplies. In the program, students learn experientially by hiking, snowshoeing, fishing, camping, and digging for fossils. The program includes five to six outdoor experiences for each grade level on state lands throughout Ferry County. The goal of the program is to increase students' critical thinking skills, academic success, peer collaboration, relationships, and engagement in the community. Vamos Outdoors Project Providing Hiking and Camping Trips for Multicultural Youth

Grant Awarded: \$21,737

The Vamos Outdoors Project will use this grant to provide backpacking and camping trips in national and state parks for Latine, migrant, and multilingual youth. Vamos will provide six summer trips with ten to twelve participants per trip to the North Cascades National Park, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest, Larrabee State Park, and Spencer Spit State Park. Many of the participants and their families do not have easy access to resources and spare time to engage in outdoor recreation. Vamos works to reduce barriers to outdoor recreation by providing free programming that includes transportation, food, and equipment. Bilingual mentors lead the trips. On backpacking trips, participants learn how to safely and joyfully spend time together outdoors. Program curriculum includes a variety of ways of connecting with the land, including Indigenous histories, settler colonial histories, and natural histories. Rainier Prep Providing Outdoors Experiences for Students

Grant Awarded: \$19,000

Rainier Prep will use this grant to provide 80 elementary and 270 middle school students seasonal camping trips and field studies in King County through the new Pathfinders program. The program integrates local field studies, grade-level curriculum, career pathway instruction, and development of outdoor skills. The program builds on science and physical education curriculum through quarterly elective enrichment classes that prepare students for off campus experiences where they can hike, backpack, camp, snowshoe, kayak, garden, and engage in stewardship activities. The primary goals of the program are to connect students to Washington's natural and cultural heritage, to provide memorable recreational and educational experiences that enhance their lives, and to encourage them to be environmental stewards. Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County Offering Outdoor Education Activities to Native Youth

Grant Awarded: \$25,000

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County will use this grant to implement the Wellpinit Native Traditions Outdoor Education Project for forty low-income Native youth through partnerships with the Spokane Tribe of Indians, the Spokane Tribe Cultural Department, and Tribe elders. Staff will provide cultural lessons and hands-on outdoor activities in the garden in the spring and fall. Tribal elders will provide stories, instruction, and hands-on experiences of traditional outdoor activities including fishing, hunting, hiking, tracking, foraging for edible wild plants, and the Stick Game. The primary goals of this project are to provide culturally aligned outdoor education, healthy snacks, and Native youth development professionals to encourage and guide at-risk Native youth. Second Chance Outreach Getting At-Risk Youth in Nature

Grant Awarded: \$24,800

Second Chance Outreach will use this grant to provide eighty youth with weekly hikes, beach walks, snowy mountain hikes, gardening, and educational walks to learn about plants and ecological systems. In its Hoods in the Woods program, the organization works with youth of color, ages eight to eighteen, who are at high risk of gang involvement and other serious consequences in Skagit and Snohomish Counties. The goals of Hoods in the Woods are to get these youth out of the four-block radius where they have spent their whole lives, introduce them to the beauty of nature, build self-esteem and teamwork, encourage physical exercise, and have fun. 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Interim Community Development Association **Grant Awarded: \$25,000** **Supporting the Wilderness Inner-city Leadership Development Program**

The Interim Community Development Association will use this grant to support year-round outdoor recreation and environmental education programming for low-income, immigrant, refugee, and predominantly Asian and Pacific Islander youth in its Wilderness Inner-city Leadership Development (WILD) program. The program engages about eighty youth in outdoor activities, many of whom have never been in the wilderness. Activities include hiking, camping, maintaining trails, and restoring salmon habitat. Peshastin-Dryden and Alpine Parent Teacher Organization **Funding Mountain Bikes for Cascade Youth** **Grant Awarded: \$24,990**

The Peshastin-Dryden and Alpine Lakes Parent Teacher Organization will use this grant to buy a fleet of thirty mountain bikes and helmets, along with a utility trailer for bike storage and transport for use by the Cascade School District. The district plans to teach mountain biking skills and bike safety to 550 students in grades three through eight during physical education classes and offer an after-school mountain biking club that will take two trips to trails in Lake Wenatchee and Squilchuck State Parks. The classes and club will introduce students to a lifelong sport that provides physical and mental health benefits. The district serves rural, north central Washington students in Peshastin, Dryden, Lake Wenatchee, Plain, and Leavenworth, where 47 percent of the students are economically disadvantaged. Braided Seeds **Grant Awarded: \$25,000** **Getting Kids of Color Outdoors**

Braided Seeds will use this grant to support its summer outdoor trips for more than forty kids of color. The nonprofit offers six day-trips, two overnight trips, and a backpacking trip. Each trip centers on connection, exploration, history, experiential learning, and play for youth ages five to seventeen. Of the youth served in this program in the past year, more than 75 percent are economically disadvantaged. Activities include hiking, farming, and kayaking and include trips along Washington's coast, the Olympic Peninsula, and Hood Canal. The goals of these trips are to provide youth with new experiences that connect them to the outdoors, empower them to take risks, nurture their curiosity, and root them in a history of Black outdoor excellence and rich environmentalism. 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Kiwanis Camp Wa-Ri-Ki Providing a Counselor-in-Training Program

Grant Awarded: \$25,000

Camp Wa-RiKi will use this grant to develop and introduce a leadership training program, Counselor-in-Training, for teens fifteen to eighteen years old. Through this three-week program, up to thirty teens will be trained and deliver a camp program and other outdoor education experiences, each spending more than eighty-two hours outdoors. The goals of the program are to introduce and train youth in the field of environmental education, help deliver programs at Camp Wa-Ri-Ki, and provide career development skills. Camp Wa-Ri-Ki is in Washougal, on more than eighteen acres in the heart of the Gifford Pinchot National Forest. On average, 60 percent of campers are economically disadvantaged. Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife Offering Wild Washington Outdoor Classrooms

Grant Awarded: \$24,002

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife will use this grant to pilot Wild Washington Outdoor Classrooms, which will provide 1,100 students in Chelan, Douglas, and Okanogan Counties with hands-on learning. Led by local practitioners, students will focus on biodiversity and cultural diversity in pre- and post-classroom sessions at Beebe Springs Wildlife Area Unit. The students will hike, observe and explore nature, and participate in storytelling and team building. The outdoor classrooms will serve all fourth graders in Eastmont, Entiat, and Wenatchee School Districts and from the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation. Wild Washington Outdoor Classrooms will be offered in the spring and fall of 2024 and the spring of 2025. Adult and Youth Learning Center Offering a Summer Youth Outdoor Learning Program

Grant Awarded: \$25,000

The Adult and Youth Learning Center will use this grant to launch a Summer Youth Outdoor Learning Program focused on African immigrant youth living in Seattle and King County. The center will engage up to sixty youth each year for two years in weekly hikes and outdoor activities at nearby state parks and nature areas. The program will culminate in a weekend day camp focused on outdoor and personal skill building. The participants will get exercise, build a personal connection with nature, try new outdoor recreation activities, and build knowledge and skills related to nature awareness, environmental education, and personal wellbeing. The center is an immigrant-led organization providing tutoring, mentoring, and enrichment activities that address the unique needs of African immigrants and other youth of color. Nisqually River Foundation

Grant Awarded: \$74,916

Supporting a Nisqually Tribal Youth Outdoor Education Program

The Nisqually River Foundation will use this grant to provide an outdoor education program for up to 106 students from the Nisqually Indian Tribe's Youth Services Program and the Wa He Lut Indian School. Meeting monthly, the students will gain exposure to outdoor recreation, traditional foods, outdoor survival skills, and careers in science, technology, engineering, and math. The program will connect youth with place-based learning throughout the Nisqually River watershed, from the source of the river at the Nisqually Glacier on Mount Rainier, to the estuary at Billy Frank Jr. Nisqually National Wildlife Refuge, and to Puget Sound at Tolmie State Park and Anderson Island. The program combines service and recreation with activities including hiking, camping, kayaking, horseback riding, snowshoeing, and exploring traditional ecological knowledge and food sources. Lower Columbia Estuary Partnership

Grant Awarded: \$74,775

Providing Outdoor Education to Cowlitz County Elementary Schools

The Lower Columbia Estuary Partnership will use this grant to provide environmental science lessons and field trips for 640 students in fourth and fifth grades at Wallace and Lexington Elementary Schools, and other high-need schools. Through its Cowlitz Education Outdoors program, the partnership will provide three lessons at school and one, full-day field trip at Seaquest State Park and Silver Lake during the next two years. The targeted schools have a majority of economically disadvantaged students, a high percentage of students with disabilities, and up to 17 percent of students who are English language learners. Offering Summer Internships for Environmental Work

The Northwest Watershed Institute will use this grant to support its Headwater to Bay Youth Environmental Education & Restoration Program, which includes a two-week, paid summer field internship for fifteen high school students each year for two years. During the school year, the students will help lead eight restoration projects for 100 younger students and community members. During the two years, this program will get more than 230 students outside. Grant Awarded: \$75,000

Providing Scholarships for Environmental Education in Olympic National Park

NatureBridge will use this grant to provide scholarships to 650 underserved kids, primarily ages eight to seventeen, to attend an overnight, Environmental Science Education Program in Olympic National Park during two years. Of the participants, 47 percent are economically disadvantaged, and 5 percent are learning English. The youth will increase their understanding of the region's ecological processes as they hike or snowshoe to waterfalls, paddle a canoe, and conduct real-world research and hands-on stewardship projects using a place-based science curriculum. NatureBridge incorporates social and emotional learning and equity and inclusion concepts into lessons. Of PlayGarden participants and staff, 70 percent have one or more physical, cognitive, or social-emotional disability. Summer camp fees operate on a sliding scale, with half the families receiving financial aid and no child turned away due to lack of money. During the school year, these children's days are filled with school, doctors' appointments, and physical, occupational, and speech therapy. In the summer, the PlayGarden gives them a chance to make friends; learn to grow, harvest, and cook from gardens; sing; make art; share stories; pick lavender; hammer flowers into bookmarks; and learn how to care for the flock of chickens and ducks. Campers are also given unstructured time for imaginative play on the fully accessible play structures. The primary goal of the summer programs is to offer safe, accessible, adventurous outdoor play closer to home. Foss Waterway Seaport Offering Eco-Kayaking on the Foss Waterway

Grant Awarded: \$73,232

The Foss Waterway Seaport will use this grant to offer kayaking and marine environmental education to about 100 disadvantaged and underserved students in Tacoma middle schools. The seaport, located on the Thea Foss Waterway in Tacoma, is a facility equipped with a marine science classroom and docks suited for hand-powered craft. Many students have never experienced boating and lack opportunities for on-water recreation, which can enrich their understanding of Puget Sound, its health, the benefits it provides, and its connection to the region's collective wellbeing. The Blue Mountain Community Foundation will use this grant launch Big Balooza, an overnight, outdoor program for ninth graders at Walla Walla High School. Incoming ninth graders will camp overnight at the Camp Wooten Retreat Center in the Blue Mountains in late September. While there, students will hike, fish, geo-cache, star gaze, try a low ropes course, and create nature crafts while building relationships with their peers, teachers, and upper-class students. Communities for a Healthy Bay Offering Environmental Justice Camps in Tacoma

Grant Awarded: \$150,000

Communities for a Healthy Bay will use this grant to continue and expand its Environmental Justice Camp program in Tacoma. The camps are designed to reach girls and gender-expansive

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youth from underserved communities in Tacoma by providing education about the local environment and environmental justice and advocacy. The program will serve about 150 students at day camps and about 50 youth at multiday summer camps. Tacoma schools lack consistent environmental education experiences across the district, which results in students from less resourced schools having little access to quality environmental education. Additionally, low-income and communities of color are underrepresented significantly in natural science fields nationally. The camps aim to spark the next generation of environmental stewards, with a focus on uplifting young women and gender-expansive youth by getting them outside. Camp activities include going on patrols through Commencement Bay, paddleboarding, kayaking, hiking, and exploring tide pools.
