## **Land Water Conservation Fund**

- Established by Congress in 1965: provides funds to preserve and develop outdoor recreation resources, including parks, trails and wildlife lands
- Administered by the National Park Service
- Permanently funded by The Great American Outdoors Act in 2021

### State Competition Regular Formula Grants (LWCF State)

- Pass-thru grants
- Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORF)
- States administer the evaluation process
- Projects may be broad in scope and must meet state plan priorities (2023 SCORP)
- Indirect costs allowed
- Grant limit: \$200,000-\$2 million dollars
- State apportionment: \$12 million dollars

# National Competition Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership (ORLP)

- Pass-thru grants
- Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP)
- States submit applications to NPS and compete nationally
- Eligibility: must meet urban population and disadvantaged area census requirements
- No indirect costs allowed
- Grant limit: \$300,000-\$15 million dollars
- Congressional appropriation: \$224 million dollars

# **Eligible Applicants**

- Cities, counties, towns
- Native American tribes
- Qualified special purpose districts (parks, ports, schools, etc.)
- State agencies





### **Eligible Project Types**

- Acquisition

### **Grant Limits**

- \$200,000 minimum
- \$2,000,000 maximum

### **Match Requirement**

50% total project cost





# Matching LWCF with Other Grants


- Non-federal source (most cases)
- Identical scope of work
- Possibilities: best fits usually
  - WWRP Local Parks
  - Youth Athletic Facilities
- Ensure all costs are eligible with matching grants
- 10% of total project cost must be non-state, non-federal dollars





# **Acquisition Projects**

- Willing seller/tenants/relocation
- Waiver of retroactivity: NPS and RCO approval before closing
- Three-year future development requirement
- Plan for structures
- Environmental screening
- Title report review
- Federal appraisal process/12-month shelf life
- Eligible Acquisition Costs: land value, relocation, environmental and cultural resources studies



## **Development Projects**

- Control and Tenure: fee simple
- Project design
- Environmental screening
- Federal permitting
- Cultural resources
- Title report review
- Eligible pre-agreement costs: A&E/design, environmental, cultural resources and permitting




## **Combination Projects**

- Challenging to meet federal readiness requirements
- Recommended approach:
  - > Phased: apply for an acquisition grant
  - > Work to meet readiness requirements
  - Design, cultural resources, environmental and federal permitting are all eligible pre-agreement costs (up to 3 years prior to submitting the grant application)
  - Apply for development funds in a future round



# Let's Review: Early Scoping!

- Alignment with LWCF and SCORP priorities
- Understand readiness requirements (budget, construction schedule, other fund sources):
  - ✓ Section 106
  - ✓ NEPA
  - ✓ Federal permits
- How much information do you have about your project and the property upon which it will occur?
- What other activities are underway or anticipated (concurrently or later) that could risk your federal funds or create a future compliance issue?

# Readiness: What's Different?

- State grant programs special conditions allowed
- LWCF no special conditions



### LWCF - that was then . . .

- Special conditions allowed time to complete cultural resources and environmental clearances
- Requirement enforcement changed during 2020 application cycle

### LWCF - this is now . . .

- No more special conditions
- LWCF is a "shovel-ready" program
- February-December timeframe between Sponsor application (PRISM) and NPS application to meet readiness



# Section 106: Cultural Resources

National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106:

Consider the effects of actions on historic properties and ensure reasonable action is taken to avoid, minimize or mitigate harm to resources.



# Cultural Resources for Applicants and Sponsors

repuricants should budget for cultural resources work for most project types (acquisitions, planning, planning, planning, etc.) because there are no unilateral exemptions. RCO even reviews project with minimal or no ground-disturbing work to ensure there is no conflict with state laws.

Cost for a survey damped.

Cost for a survey depends on the scope, scale, and location of the project. A survey for a discrete project action in a low-risk area may cost \$2,000.55,000. A survey for a activities in a very high-risk area (or known site) could cost \$50,000 or more.

# Section 106: The Basics

- Required for <u>all</u> LWCF projects
- RCO provides high-level cultural resources review for all applications
- Complete application and developed design assist S106 process
- For projects within funding reach, cultural resources instructions (survey, IDP, etc.) delivered to applicants and consultation is initiated
- 30-day minimum consultation period
- Depending on results of consultation, additional dialogue or work may be required to complete the S106 process
- Starting sooner (with a well-informed design) ensures smoother process

# **NEPA:** The Basics

- Required for <u>all</u> LWCF projects
- A well-informed Environmental Resources Survey (ERS) will assist the NEPA process
- Expertise: ensure form authors are qualified to assess data and respond to questions
- Documentation: cite existing studies and reports
- Most projects will qualify for Categorical Exclusion from further environmental review, however, the ERS will be relied upon to support a CE
- NPS may concur with another federal agency's NEPA determination (i.e., USACE)



## **Federal Permits**

A sponsor of a project that requires any federal permits, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' permit, must provide a copy of the issued permit within sixty days of the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board's approval of the preliminary ranked list of projects or the project will not be funded.

If it has been determined that the project does not need a federal permit, the sponsor must provide documentation of that decision including which federal regulator made this determination. Due to the long lead time for obtaining federal permits, the sponsor must start this process before submitting the grant application. See the Applicant's To Do List.


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✓ Consider application/award/construction start timeline and estimate costs accordingly



## Design

- ✓ Must be far enough along to fully understand the impacts of the project on the landscape to assess environmental and cultural resources effects
- ✓ 30% design level recommended
- Design and budget for accessibility: must meet or exceed Americans with Disabilities Act Standards





## Investigate

- ✓ Complete cultural resources PRISM questions to assist initial RCO guidance and to establish readiness for Section 106 consultation
- ✓ Complete Environmental Resources Survey form to assist initial RCO guidance and to establish readiness for NEPA determination
- Review title report for entire park to understand existing encumbrances



## LWCF Boundary Map

- Places entire park (not just funded area or improvements) under LWCF conversion policy in perpetuity
- Confer early with your OGM
- Disclose existing third-party rights and infrastructure serving outside park.
- Order title report early to inform the boundary map. Important to understand what is going on in entire park, not just the project area.
- RCO and NPS pre-approval to consider rare exclusions of ineligible uses or future footprints.

# What does a successful LWCF application look like?

- Spokane County Bear Lake Renovation: expanded non-motorized lake access.
- Complex; USACE permit required
- Incurred pre-agreement costs for design, cultural resources & permitting (underway at time of application)
- Environmental Resources Survey and associated material were robust and well-supported
- LWCF Boundary Map included entire park with no exceptions
- Federal agreement issued several months after complete application submitted to NPS









## Is it too soon to apply for LWCF funds?

- Design stage is too early (conceptual; APE undetermined)
- Permitting has not been initiated
- No environmental investigations
- Not enough information known to robustly complete an Environmental Resources Survey
- Scope of work not well-defined and subject to significant changes
- Not enough information to commit to an LWCF boundary required for long-term compliance



## **Key Points**


- Meeting readiness requirements by December 2024 is <u>essential</u> before ranked projects within funding reach will be determined actionable and forwarded to NPS: Section 106/NEPA clearances (all projects) Federal permits in place (if required)
- LWCF Boundary map final:

   Sponsor, RCO and NPS sign
   In perpetuity and covers entire park
- Incurring pre-agreement costs necessary to meet readiness requirements









## Build America, Buy America<sup>38</sup>

Build America, Buy America Act requires that all iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials used for, or incorporated into, a federally funded project are produced in the United States This includes the purchase of bridges, girders, docks, fencing, drinking fountains, play structures, and more. The procurement preference applies to the following categories of products and materials:

- All iron and steel. All manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, must occur in the United States.
- All manufactured products. Must be manufactured in the United States and the
  cost of its domestically mined, produced, or manufactured components must be
  greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all its components unless another
  standard applies under law or regulation.
- All construction materials. All manufacturing processes for the construction material must occur in the United States.

### **Projects with Federal Money**

For projects funded with the Land and Water Conservation Fund, the project sponsor must instruct the appraiser and review appraiser to use the standards set forth in the *Uniform Appraisal Standards for Federal Land Acquisitions* (UASFLA).

In addition, projects in the Land and Water Conservation Fund must follow special appraisal instructions (see *Manual 15: Land and Water Conservation Fund*). When an acquisition project will receive funding from both state and federal sources, the project sponsor may apply the federal standards to the entire project.



- Legal Opinion: first-time applicants

- Authorizing Resolution: establish authority to proceed with application and enter agreement with RCO



## Requirements to apply:

 For LWCF, applicants must have a current comprehensive outdoor recreation plan on file with RCO to apply.

## Plans are due to RCO by March 1!

Plans are effective for six years.

RCO website has planning requirements and lists of applicants with plans on file.

### Account Set-Up and Applying

#### About PRISM

PRISM is an online computer system open to the public to apply for RCO grants, review and manage information on funded grants, and produce reports on projects. More detailed information about PRISM components, forms, and training videos is on the RCO <u>PRISM website</u>.

#### Creating a PRISM Account

To enter an application, an applicant must sign up for a <u>SecureAccess Washington</u> account and submit a <u>PRISM account form</u>. When using either of these databases for the first time, the applicant must complete a double sign-in.

- Using SecureAccess Washington credentials, login to PRISM.
- · When redirected to the SecureAccess login page, enter the SecureAccess credentials.
- · When redirected to a one-time PRISM sign-in page, enter the PRISM login credentials.
- · The applicant will be directed back to the PRISM home page.

This double sign-in will happen only once. After completing the double sign-in, the applicant will use SecureAccess Washington credentials to log into PRISM.

#### Beginning the Pre-Application


To begin an application, log into PRISM, select the +New Application button and find the Community Outdoor Athletic Facilities Pre-Application option in the drop-down menu. Once the pre-application has been started, RCO uses this information to assign an outdoor grants manager to the project. This manager guides the applicant through the process, reviews application materials, helps determine whether the proposal is eligible, and may visit the project site to discuss site-specific details. When working through the PRISM pre-application, be sure to read the guidance on each page closely and save work frequently. A more detailed checklist of the different pre-application sections and required fields is in the Pre-Application Checklist.

#### Submitting the Pre-Application


The application includes the data entered into PRISM and all attachments. The applicant must submit the application before the deadline. The Check Application for Errors button on the Submit Application screen will indicate which pages are incomplete. An incomplete application and an application received after the deadline will be rejected unless RCO's director has approved a late submission in advance.

### **Background**

During the past year, Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) staff worked with the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board to revise grant evaluation criteria in six recreation and conservation focused grant programs. With these revisions, RCO and the board intend to improve opportunities for outdoor recreation and physical activity in communities that have less access to parks and open space. RCO also aims to distribute grants more equitably by providing greater opportunities for communities with less capacity and fewer financial resources.

### **Programs Affected**

Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Youth Athletic Facilities (YAF) Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program (WWRP)

- Local Parks
- Trails
- Water Access

### **What Changed?**

Four criteria commonly used in all six programs were revised: Project Need, Project Scope, Project Design, and Project Engagement.

A new unscored "Project Introduction" was added, while the "Expansion or Renovation" criterion was eliminated from WWRP Local Parks and Water Access.

Applicants no longer need to copy socioeconomic and health data from the application data tool to paste into their project presentations.



#### **Project Need: Statewide Priorities**

A data-driven needs assessment.

Project Need consists of two parts: one scored by RCO, and another scored by the advisory committees. The advisory committees will score answers to narrative questions.

The RCO scores are data-driven and reflect statewide priorities in the 2023 Recreation and Conservation Plan and recommendations in RCO's grant program equity review. Points are awarded based on the project location and rankings for social vulnerability, poor health outcomes from the Department of Health's Washington Tracking Network. Points also are awarded for green space availability, based on a spatial analysis from RCO's equity review.

## Ready, Set, Go

## **Implementation**

- Execute an RCO grant agreement, after federal agreement is issued to RCO
- Comply with milestones in the agreement
- Secure an RCO Notice to Proceed before starting work
- Complete project in a timely manner

## Billing, progress reports, and records

- RCO pays on a reimbursement basis only
- Sponsors must submit a bill at least annually
- Sponsors must submit progress reports
- Sponsors must keep meticulous records
- Sponsors must notify RCO of any anticipated changes to the scope of work or timeline



## Long-Term Compliance

## What are the ongoing responsibilities?

- Review Manual 7: Long-Term Obligations and Manual 15: Land and Water Conservation Fund
- Inspections: final and compliance
- Project changes: name change, facility change, etc.
- Maintenance: sponsor's responsibility
- Land acquired for future development: three years
- Open to the public: nondiscrimination laws
- Income: requirements for income use
- Acknowledgement: signs, publicity, press releases, etc.
- Subject to LWCF Boundary Map, conversion policy
- If something changes contact RCO to discuss options.
