Requirements to apply:

 For WWRP, applicants must have a current comprehensive outdoor recreation plan on file with RCO to apply.

Plans are due to RCO by March 1!

Plans are effective for six years. RCO website has planning requirements and lists of applicants with plans on file. Contact Nick Norton at <u>nicholas.norton@rco.wa.gov</u>.

2. ALL first-time applicants need to submit a legal opinion to RCO by the technical completion deadline.







Some local agencies may reduce their match in the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program's (WWRP) Local Parks, Trails, and Water Access Categories and the Youth Athletic Facilities Program (YAF), if they meet any of the match reduction criteria below:


- Communities in need; A city, town, tribe, or eligible special purpose district with 20,000
 residents or fewer and a median household income less than \$82,400 (the state median
 household income). See our policy below for complete details.
- Underserved populations; A city, town, tribe, or special purpose district with a median household income less than \$82,400 (the state median household income), and a project in a census block group where the median household income is less than \$57,680 (70 percent of the state median household income). See our policy below for complete details.
- Counties in need; A county with a median household income less than \$57,680 (70 percent of the state median income), a designation of distressed (as defined by Washington Employment Security Department), or 60 percent or more of its land base in a non-taxable status. See our policy below for complete details.
- Federal disaster areas; A city, town, tribe, county, or special purpose district that is, or is located in, a federally declared disaster area (major disaster under the Stafford Act) must provide at least 25 percent match. See our policy below for complete details.







Background

During the past year, Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) staff worked with the Recreation and Conservation Funding Board to revise grant evaluation criteria in six recreation and conservation focused grant programs. With these revisions, RCO and the board intend to improve opportunities for outdoor recreation and physical activity in communities that have less access to parks and open space. RCO also aims to distribute grants more equitably by providing greater opportunities for communities with less capacity and fewer financial resources.

What Changed?

Four criteria commonly used in all six programs were revised: Project Need, Project Scope, Project Design, and Project Engagement.

A new unscored "Project Introduction" was added, while the "Expansion or Renovation" criterion was eliminated from WWRP Local Parks and Water Access.

Applicants no longer need to copy socioeconomic and health data from the application data tool to paste into their project presentations.

Project Need: Statewide Priorities A data-driven needs assessment.

Project Need consists of two parts: one scored by RCO, and another scored by the advisory committees. The advisory committees will score answers to narrative questions.

The RCO scores are data-driven and reflect statewide priorities in the 2023 Recreation and Conservation Plan and recommendations in RCO's grant program equity review. Points are awarded based on the project location and rankings for **social vulnerability**, poor health outcomes from the Department of Health's Washington Tracking Network. Points also are awarded for green space availability, based on a spatial analysis from RCO's equity review.



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

The Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program provides funding for a broad range of land protection and outdoor recreation, including local and state parks, trails, water access, and the conservation and restoration of state land.

The Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program was envisioned as a way for the state to accomplish two goals: acquire valuable recreation and habitat lands before they were lost to other uses and develop recreation areas for a growing population.

This landmark legislation passed in 1990 and the grant program's continued funding have come about through the support of governors, the Legislature, and groups such as the many organizations comprising the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Coalition.





In many RCO grant programs, applicants must make PowerPoint® presentations to participate in the technical reviews and evaluations. This document provides guidance for developing a

Technical Review

An applicant may present the project virtually to the advisory committee. Participation in this technical review is not required but is highly recommended. It serves as a practice session for the upcoming evaluation and provides valuable feedback. The focus of technical review is on eligibility and the technical aspects (scope, design, cost, feasibility, etc.) of the project.

Participation in the project evaluation meeting is mandatory for all projects to be considered for

Presenters

Only one presenter is needed, but other individuals may accompany the main presenters if they have technical or special expertise pertinent to the project. If needed, these individuals may be called upon to deliver bits of critical information throughout the presentation or to help answer

Presentation Format

An applicant will be given a timeslot (duration varies by program) for a presentation. Develop the presentation in a manner that easily explains the project to the advisory committee. The





- Acknowledgement: signs, publicity, press releases, etc.
