Grant Requested: \$250,000

U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest Hiring Backcountry Rangers for the Wilderness Areas

The Snoqualmie Ranger District will use this grant to fund rangers and interns for two years to patrol backcountry destinations in a 500,000-acre zone that includes 177,129 acres in the Alpine Lakes, Norse Peak, and Clearwater Wilderness areas. Rangers and volunteers will patrol more than four hundred miles of trail and hundreds of destination lakes, streams, and summits used by more than 400,000 hikers, backpackers, climbers, mountain bikers, anglers, hunters, foragers, horseback riders, and others a year. Rangers contact visitors in the field, while monitoring and protecting natural and cultural resources, and backcountry facilities on trails that can receive more than one thousand visitors in a single day. Current funding is inadequate to pay professional rangers to provide law enforcement. The goal is to contact visitors in the field to better protect resources and facilities, reduce vandalism and user conflicts, and increase visitor satisfaction. U.S. Forest Service, Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest Funding Wilderness Rangers Grant Requested: \$198,707

The Wenatchee River Ranger District will use this grant to fund four seasonal rangers to patrol high-use areas in the Alpine Lakes, Henry M. Jackson, and Glacier Peak Wilderness areas for two seasons. Rangers will educate visitors, promote Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities, ensure visitor safety, and enforce regulations. The rangers primarily will patrol the Enchantment permit area because of its high proportion of new-to-nature visitors. Visitation has skyrocketed in the Enchantments and now requires more rangers to keep up with public contacts and resource protection. Visitors include hikers, backpackers, climbers, horseback riders, sightseers, anglers, and those viewing wildlife. The rangers will educate the public about the wilderness, why it is important, and how to preserve the wilderness character. U.S. Forest Service, Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest Funding Wilderness and Backcountry Rangers Grant Requested: \$250,000

The Methow Ranger District will use this grant to fund three seasonal rangers, two other rangers, and community volunteers to patrol popular areas for two seasons. The rangers will talk with visitors, promote Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities, and enforce regulations. Patrols will focus on high-use areas for nonmotorized recreation in the North Cascades Scenic Corridor, Pasayten and Lake Chelan-Sawtooth Wilderness areas, Pacific



Crest Trail, and Pacific Northwest Trail. The area has been popularized in guidebooks and social media and attracts visitors from all over the world. This area receives more than 190,000 visitor use days annually. Recreationists include hikers, backpackers, mountain bikers, climbers, photographers, wildlife viewers, backcountry skiers, stock users, hunters, and anglers. U.S. Forest Service, Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest Providing Patrols for Entiat Chelan Ranger District Grant Requested: \$60,000

The Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest will use this grant to pay for staff and volunteers and support partner organizations in patrolling multiuse trails and trailheads in the Entiat and Chelan Ranger District in Chelan County. The rangers will patrol about 455 miles of trail, thirteen campgrounds, and twenty-nine trailheads. The rangers will promote Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities and good riding practices. Much of the area has highly erosive pumice soil or fragile meadows. U.S. Forest Service, Olympic National Forest Providing Education and Enforcement

Grant Requested: \$203,000

The Olympic National Forest will use this grant to fund four seasonal staff for two years for education and safety patrols in the Hood Canal Ranger District and Pacific Ranger District. Patrols will cover all trailheads, campgrounds, dispersed campsites, and backcountry areas. The trails are for nonmotorized use, especially hiking, backpacking, horseback riding, and mountain biking. Staff will educate visitors about responsible recreation practices and enforce regulations and fee collection. U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest Providing Field Education and Wilderness Patrols Grant Requested: \$188,500

The Darrington Ranger District will use this grant to fund staff for two summers who will educate visitors in wilderness areas about trail etiquette and Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities, enforce regulations, and complete visitor use projects. Additionally, these rangers will recruit, train, and manage volunteers who perform educational and enforcement contacts. About 275,000 people annually recreate on 390 miles of trail crossing about 560,000 acres, including 290,000 acres in the Glacier Peak, Boulder River, and Henry M. Jackson Wilderness areas. Visitors are hiking, mountaineering, snowshoeing, fishing, horseback riding, and foraging. Current funding is inadequate and this project will increase the district's



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ability to reach visitors in the field and begin building a long-term, sustainable volunteer program that encourages involvement in protecting forest resources. U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest Providing Front Country Patrols Grant Requested: \$250,000

The Snoqualmie Ranger District will use this grant to help pay for front country environmental education and community outreach programs. The grant will support forest protection officers, educators, information specialists, and a volunteer program in the summers and winters of two years. Steadily declining budgets and retiring employees have decreased the Service's ability to respond to recreation needs. More than one million people visit the district's fifty trailheads, six developed campgrounds, and hundreds of popular dispersed camping sites annually. The district encompasses 300,000 acres of which 189,000 are non-wilderness and accessible to a broad range of recreation visitors including campers, hikers, equestrians, off-road vehicle riders, recreational target shooters, and hunters. The district plans to conduct nearly twenty-eight thousand visitor contacts through this project, with an emphasis on novice visitors who may desire to do the right thing to protect natural resources, but simply lack proper knowledge and skills. U.S. Forest Service, Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest Funding Alpine Lakes Wilderness Patrols Grant Requested: \$150,000

The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to help fund two rangers and up to four volunteer interns to provide education and enforcement patrols on trails and camp destinations in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness. The staff will educate wilderness visitors about how to protect the wilderness and trail resources. The district's portion of Alpine Lakes Wilderness is one of the most popular areas in Washington for hiking, backpacking, horseback riding, horse packing, hunting, fishing, mountaineering, and climbing. The wilderness and adjacent areas contain sixteen trailheads, two hundred miles of trail, multiple high-country routes, more than sixty lake destinations, and more than nine hundred wilderness campsites. Due to rapid population increases, the area now receives more than eighty thousand annual visits. The staff will promote Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities. Grant Requested: \$90,000

The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to fund a full-time seasonal ranger and three interns to patrol popular, dispersed recreation areas, major trailheads, and developed



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campgrounds in the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest for two years. Staff will focus on educating visitors about proper sanitation, campsite selection, paying fees, and environmental stewardship. Consistent staff presence reduces environmental degradation, limits user conflicts, and fosters greater environmental stewardship. Along with education and enforcement patrols, staff will promote the "Respect the River" program to mitigate damage to the shoreline, bull trout, and other animals that live in the river from the impacts of extensive public use. The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to fund one full-time officer and support its large volunteer program for two years. The staff and volunteers provide education and enforcement on nearly four hundred miles of trail, at seven campgrounds, and at more than thirty multiuse trailheads in Kittitas County. The trail system is one of the most heavily used in the state, serving thousands of users each weekend. The staff and volunteers help protect natural resources, provide information, and teach safe motorized travel principles. Grant Requested: \$139,150

The Northwest Motorcycle Association will use this grant to support its educational program for two years. The association will offer workshops to build the skills of motorcyclists, educate riders about how to minimize their impact on the environment, and teach trail etiquette. The association also will offer trail maintenance workshops and chainsaw training classes for federal certification. Riders who complete the program can become trail ambassadors. Grant Requested: \$213,666

The Department of Natural Resources will use this grant to fund a recreation warden and additional department police services to patrol two hundred miles of trail, five campgrounds, seven trailheads, and day-use areas. Staff will work in the Tahuya, Green Mountain, and Hood Canal State Forests, the Stavis Natural Resources Conservation Area, and other land, mostly in Kitsap and Mason Counties. Staff will focus on off-road vehicle use compliance and fixing safety concerns for all trail users. Staff also will support Forest Watch and Camp Host volunteers who educate visitors about rules and principles of good stewardship. The Department of Natural Resources will use this grant to fund one trail steward to patrol the most popular recreation areas in Snohomish County: Reiter Foothills Forest, Forest Glade, Morning Star Natural Resources Conservation Area, and Sultan basin. The steward will focus on identifying potential health, safety, and resource damage concerns while educating visitors about appropriate use and environmental stewardship principles. Combined, these areas provide several hundred miles of road, about seventy-five miles of trail, seven campgrounds, multiple dispersed campsites, and trailheads on more than fifty thousand acres. These areas provide a wide range of outdoor opportunities, including all-terrain vehicle riding, hiking, backpacking, camping, climbing, horse riding, fishing, gathering, hunting, motorcycling, mountain biking, sightseeing, and snow activities. The department also will buy small tools, minor equipment, and educational materials. This grant also will fund several seasonal employees to work in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness and Mount Baker Snoqualmie National Forest, and seasonal outreach interns to work in partnership with Mountains to Sound Greenway Trust's Trailhead Ambassador program to provide information to visitors in the Snoqualmie Corridor and Middle Fork Snoqualmie River Valley. Grant Requested: \$30,000

The Naches Ranger District will use this grant to partially fund up to four seasonal education rangers and up to four part-time volunteers to patrol areas in the wilderness and backcountry for two years. The rangers will promote wilderness stewardship, The rangers will promote Leave-No-Trace techniques for reducing damage from outdoor activities, resource protection, and visitor safety. The Naches Ranger District encompasses popular hiking, backpacking, and horse packing destinations, including areas such as Dewey Lakes, Twin Sisters Lakes, Warm Lake, Union Creek, and Surprise Lake–all of which have been highlighted in many publications. The Chinook Pass Trailhead sees up to one hundred visitors on a busy weekend day, many of which embark on hikes into the backcountry, and are often unprepared for the conditions they encounter. Washington Department of Natural Resources Grant Requested: \$184,154 Funding Staff to Patrol Elbe Hills and Tahoma State Forests

The Department of Natural Resources will use this grant to fund one education and enforcement warden, who will provide information, education, and enforcement year-round in Elbe Hills and Tahoma State Forests. Combined the forests offer seventy-two miles of trail, nine trailheads, four campgrounds, and three ski-huts on 54,740 acres. The grant also will be used to print, buy, and distribute informational materials. The forests are used by off-road vehicle riders, horse riders, hikers, hunters, campers, target shooters, cross-country skiers, and snowshoers. The warden will focus on trail use, camping and campfire rules, target shooting rules, Discover Pass use, vandalism, hunting, resource gathering, dumping, and Sno-Park use. Both State Forests have seen increased use, vandalism, dumping, illegal travel, and user conflict in the past four years. Spokane County Grant Requested: \$159,175 Expanding the Spokane County Education and Enforcement Program

The Spokane County Parks, Recreation and Golf Department will use this grant to fund two seasonal full-time park aids and buy two e-bikes, supplies, equipment, and materials. The aides will work with the county's park ranger to patrol more than eleven thousand acres, more than 350 miles of trail, lakes, river access, a campground, and two off-road vehicle parks. U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest Providing Wilderness Rangers Grant Requested: \$47,830

The Mount Baker Ranger District will use this grant to fund temporary seasonal wilderness rangers and buy tools, trail signs, waste management, gear for glacier travel, and training. The district encompasses more than 189,000 acres of Wilderness Area and Mount Baker, a mountain which annually draws thousands of climbers. The rangers patrol high-elevation trails, camps, and routes on Mount Baker to educate climbers on wilderness ethics, resource protection techniques, and safety issues, and to maintain trail and backcountry facilities. The rangers also provide information to supervisors on public use, trail and climbing conditions, and special-use permittees. Educational encounters and maintenance work help the district manage the impacts on the mountain from recreational use and promote user responsibility and stewardship of public lands.
